

Codes Ordinance Adopted

The Board of Supervisors adopted the Building Codes Ordinance (#1995-07) at its October 23, 1995, meeting. This means that all new construction and renovation in the Township must meet the requirements established by the BOCA National Building Code or the CABO One and Two Family Dwelling Code.

Items of note included in this Ordinance:

- All homes in the Township are now required to have battery-powered smoke detectors located outside the main sleeping area of the home.
- A hard-wired smoke detector with a battery back-up system shall be installed in all new dwellings, be located outside the main sleeping area, and be installed prior to the taking possession of any dwelling by a new owner.

The new Ordinance also includes provisions for property maintenance enforcement.

FAQs

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ON REFUSE AND RECYCLING

Have a question about your trash and recycling collection? You're not alone. The Lancaster Township office staff here notes residents' most frequently asked questions—and their answers!

Q. Because of my health problems, I receive several injections. How can I dispose of the hypodermic needles?

A. Needles—or anything sharp—should be placed in cans with securely fitting lids (such as coffee cans), then thrown in the trash. The Township was recently informed that there are special containers for these needles. They are available from your doctor or hospital and can be thrown away at your doctor's office or at the hospital. Please check with your doctor or hospital to see if they offer this service.

Q. How can I get rid of cardboard and junk mail?

A. These items must both be placed in the trash. Cardboard boxes can be broken down to take up as little space as possible.

Q. I just paid my trash bill OR I don't think I've gotten my trash bill recently. When are they mailed out?

A. The trash bills come out April 1 and October 1 every year. They are due April 30 and October 30. Any bill that is not in the Township Office by the due date will incur a late charge.

Q. When can I put out my large appliances for collection?

A. Large appliance collection days occur on your first trash pick-up in May and in December.

Q. The trash hauler missed my trash/recyclables. What should I do?

A. Call the Township Office right away and we'll send the hauler back to pick up whatever they missed, as long as you followed the proper procedures. Remember, you are permitted two 32-gallon containers of trash each week. Anything over that requires extra service tags. You are permitted to put out as many recyclables as you have. ■

Summer volleyball for men, women, and coed teams, as well as men's and women's basketball will soon be accepting registrations.

Golf lessons for adults, taught by pro Tony Sylvia, will be offered in four different sessions, the first beginning April 17. Here's your chance to wow your buddies with your smooth golfing techniques! Adults can also be a certified ASA Umpire in our course that runs February 15-March 21.

Learn the safe way to handle a handgun in the LRC's Basic Handgun Safety Course in one of three sessions offered this winter. Instruction covers

School District of Lancaster Updates

► **Central Campus Expansion Project**

The construction of McCaskey East High School is proceeding according to schedule. The interior work will be done during the winter months. The Planning Team is in the process of preparing the drawings and specifications for the renovation of J.P. McCaskey High School which is scheduled to start in June 1996.

► **Site-Based Reform**

Site councils are now in operation in all of the District's schools. Each council has representation from the following stakeholder groups: professional staff, support staff, parents, community, and administration. The school sites have developed a set of bylaws and strategies to communicate how their site councils will operate. All site-council decisions must abide by school law, district policy, and district parameters. The major thrust of the site council is to make decisions in the best interest of students and schoolwide population.

At the District level, the enlarged committee, comprised of representatives from the stakeholder groups mentioned above, continues to serve in a liaison role. Subcommittees from this enlarged group include communications, calling card, and parameters.

► **Budget**

Budget work sessions were held with the Board of School Directors throughout the summer and fall of 1995 in preparation for the development of the 1996-97 budget. These work sessions will continue until the budget is adopted in June, 1996. These budget meetings are announced in the local newspapers and are open to the public.

► **ISO 9000**

The Oversight Committee membership includes four members of the School Board and four members of the Lancaster Alliance. Dr. Shekletski, Superintendent; Mrs. Kirchner, External Funding; Dr. Kiefer, Planning; and Mr. Baldrige, Executive Director, have also attended these meetings. The Oversight Committee has discussed the Project Plan, budget, implementation and responsibilities. ■

Highway Superintendent: Snow On the Way, Out of the Way

Now that leaf collection has ended, we turn our attention to winter maintenance. Here are a few suggestions that can make all our lives easier in the event of snowfall.

Common sense dictates priorities when maintaining roadways during winter storms. Major and Minor Collector Roads will be the primary targets of our road crew. PennDOT maintains Marietta Avenue, Columbia Avenue, Millersville Pike, New Danville Pike, Millersville Road, and East King Street. Lancaster Township is reimbursed by PennDOT for providing maintenance on East Orange Street, Riverside Avenue from East Orange to East King Street, and Wabank Road from the city line to Millersville Road.

Other roads in these classifications are North President Avenue, South West End Avenue, School House Road, Wilson Drive between Columbia Avenue and Marietta Avenue, Atkins Avenue, Spencer Avenue, Abbeyville Road, Gable Park Road, and Charles Road. In addition, roads where emergency

services, such as fire departments, hospitals, and nursing homes are located will receive priority maintenance.

Maintenance of Local Access Roads—any roads not mentioned above—will follow the Major and Minor Collector Roads. In addition to our road crew, we hire independent contractors to assist with snow removal. It takes quite a while to cover every road in the Township, so please be patient.

Your cooperation with snow removal on your property will make our job easier, and save you the work of moving the same snow more than once.

- If possible, wait to clear your driveway until after the road has been completely plowed. The minimum number of passes required to clear a road is two, but may be as high as four or more depending on the amount of snowfall received.


- Plow or shovel snow to the side of your driveway that is away from the flow of the traffic (see diagram). Clearing snow for a distance prior to your driveway allows the plow to "unload" before reaching your driveway. By piling snow away from the direction of oncoming snow plows, the bulk of the snow will not be pushed back onto the driveway.

- Eliminate snowpiles at the driveway entrance whenever possible. High accumulations of snow will obstruct the vision of motorists when exiting from the driveway and hinder the ability of oncoming motorists to see you pulling out of the driveway,


creating another potential for accidents.

- Do not push or throw snow onto the roads at anytime. This creates hazardous driving conditions and homeowners can be held responsible for accidents which result after snow has been shoveled onto the roads.

While we make every effort to limit damage to property and mailboxes during winter road maintenance, we do recommend that you place reflective markers on 3' posts along the edge of your property. In an attempt to remove as much snow as possible from roadways and shoulders mailboxes sometimes topple because they are too close to the road or were atop poorly maintained supports. Wet, heavy snow also increases the chance of damage to mailboxes because this type of snow has a much stronger force coming off the plow. The repair of mailboxes and lawns in the Township right-of-way is the property owner's responsibility. Trees and shrubbery grown over the roadway also reduce the efficiency of snow removal. The property owner is responsible for keeping growth off the roadway and ten feet above the road. Keep in mind that snow or ice will cause the branches to hang lower than when they are dry. We would prefer that you take care of the trimming, but if you don't, the Township will see that it gets done. However, the Township reserves the right to have the trimming done at the owner's expense. ■

VANDALISM TO SIGNS ISN'T FUN AND GAMES

Sign vandalism is becoming a serious problem throughout not only Lancaster Township but everywhere else you may travel. In addition to the financial cost associated with replacing damaged or defaced signs, a vandalized sign may cause you difficulty in reaching your destination.

There are two types of street signs, informational and regulatory. Informational signs provide the names of streets or assist you in finding places such as hospitals, municipal buildings, and historic sites. Have you ever tried finding an address in an unfamiliar neighborhood without street signs? It would be virtually impossible without the assistance of a local resident. Consider not being able to find a hospital in an emergency because of sign vandalism. In such an event, the cost of the vandalism becomes extremely high.

Regulatory signs include Stop, Speed Limit, One Way, and No Parking. Although these signs are often considered an inconvenience, think about the potential hazards associated with not having the signs along our roads. A missing or damaged stop sign can lead to a serious accident when two vehicles enter an intersection at the same time. Parking is prohibited near intersections to allow for better visibility for vehicles or pedestrians trying to enter the intersection. Parking may also be prohibited because of the width of the roadway or on turns where

visibility may be blocked by parked vehicles. The inconvenience associated with these signs is more than worth the hazards associated with their absence.

If you see a sign which has been vandalized, please report the location to a member of the highway department or a staff member at the municipal office. If you see someone vandalizing a sign, please report the incident to the police department. The sooner this

information reaches the police, the better the chance of the culprit's being caught and paying for the damage. Also keep your eyes open for trees or

shrubbery which may be growing in front of signs. Many times a sign is visible when you get close to it but cannot be seen far enough ahead to be effective. If you do not keep growth clear of the signs, the highway department may have to trim your plants. However, the Township reserves the right to have the trimming done at the owner's expense. Although the workers attempt to trim as little as possible, the results may not be exactly

what you want.

Thank you for helping keep our roads safe by assisting with our sign-monitoring program. ■
