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**How to
Communicate
with the
Police Bureau**

LANCASTER TOWNSHIP RESIDENTS called for police service 3,306 times in 1995. In recognition of your needs, as well as efficient communication with the police, there are several phone numbers to use when calling for police support.

- **911** - for injury or immediate threat to life and/or property.
- **664-1180** - for questions on crimes where no threat to life, property, or injury is immediate. This is a toll-free line to Lancaster Wide Communications. By using this number you'll be directly connected to a telecommunicator who takes your information and relays it to the appropriate Police Bureau for action.

- **291-4911** - to speak on an administrative matter. This number is not to report crimes in progress or a criminal matter that has occurred.

The Police Bureau strives to meet the needs of the citizens of Lancaster Township. The initial call for service, whether to 911 for an immediate emergency or to 664-1180 for non-emergency police requests, can directly affect the response you receive. ■

NOW, A BETTER CHANCE OF SAVING LIVES

New Equipment Is Being Used Outside of Hospitals

Sudden death occurs when the heart stops pumping blood, the victim loses consciousness, stops breathing, and consequently is unable to call for help. Death is certain without the delivery of an electrical shock to the heart within nine to ten minutes. Defibrillators have been used in hospitals for 35 years for this purpose and require skilled medical personnel to administer treatment. A new Automated External Defibrillator is now available for use outside the hospital. The AED analyzes heart rhythm and delivers a shock only if necessary.

In April of this year, the Lancaster Heart Foundation initiated a pilot program under the direction of Dr. Leon Anderson, placing AEDs in police cruisers of eight Lancaster County agencies, including the Lancaster Bureau of Police, and one AED has also been placed at the Park City Mall.

When someone loses consciousness and stops breathing, call 911 immedi-

ately, tell the operator someone is unconscious, and give your precise location. Police and ambulances are dispatched simultaneously. If you or anyone else is trained in CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation), begin it immediately. CPR can expand the window of opportunity for survival by several minutes. Remember, minutes and even seconds are critical; as a team, we can save lives. ■

**GETTING BACK TO NATURE WITH
NATIVE SHADE TREES**


William Penn's Woods were smack in the middle of the Eastern deciduous forest, a community defined by large trees which shed their leaves in the fall. For the past 12,000 years, since the retreat of the last glacier, this forest has cloaked the Eastern United States. This same forest might eventually return if we were to abandon Lancaster County, because such self-organizing and self-sustaining systems obey the laws of nature and require no help from humans.

Can we escape from some landscaping chores by heeding the wisdom of Mother Nature through using parts of the Eastern deciduous forest in our landscaping? Could this make our environment more wholesome? Of course; Mother Nature knows best. We should be on her side. Shade trees most adapted to our environment are members of that original forest: oaks, hickories, most maples, beech, etc.¹ Not only do these trees provide us with local air conditioning by providing cool shade sought by many on hot summer days, but they also intercept dust and noxious fumes, and abate noise. The shade also protects us from ultra-violet light, a cause of skin cancer.

Native forest trees are adapted to native pests and require little in the way of care. Hence fertilizers and pesticides used to maintain lawn can usually be avoided. While these native trees provide us with shade all summer, they conveniently shed their leaves when we would like a little more sunlight entering our homes in the fall and winter. How accommodating! Leaf fall is a concern only where the carpet of leaf litter will damage a lawn. However, those interested in more naturalistic and healthy landscape need not remove leaves, but encourage shrubs and wildflowers commonly found in woods to take the place of at least part of the lawn².

Fall is the best time for tree planting. Dormant trees, inactive for the winter, are stressed less by the shock of transplanting. The roots of a fall-transplanted tree will grow over winter and provide the new shoot growth with water and nutrients in the spring. Select a few appropriate native trees; examples include American beech, any of the hickories, sugar maple, red maple, red oak, white oak, black oak, and chestnut oak. Establishing a tree can range from simply planting a handful of acorns to blowing the vacation budget on a prize specimen; in 20 years no one will know the difference. Avoid foreign species such as Norway maples which have been taking over our remnant native forests. The Peterson Field Guide *Eastern Trees*³ is a good guide to native trees. Work with Mother Nature to reduce the burden of yard chores and at the same time establish a more healthful environment around your home. ■

Highway Superintendent: Leaves, Snow, and Paving Are on the Agenda

Leaf Collection season is upon us with pickups to begin October 7, continuing through December 13. The 1996 leaf collection schedule is:

- Mondays**, October 7 through December 9: All streets between Columbia and Marietta Avenues.
- Tuesdays**, October 8 through December 10: Davis Drive, 400 and 500 blocks of Atkins, Spencer, and S. President Avenue; Hamilton Park area follows the Tuesday morning posted street schedule; City Mill Road, Conestoga Woods, Conestoga Boulevard, and East End will follow the Tuesday afternoon posted street schedule.
- Wednesdays**, October 9 through December 11: Hamilton Park area follows Wednesday morning posted street schedule; East End follows Wednesday afternoon posted street schedule and finish any other East End pickups.
- Thursdays**, October 10 through

December 12: north side of Marietta Avenue and all streets north up to Newton Road.
Fridays, October 11 through December 13: west side of Abbeyville Road, Bausman area, Hoover Road, Honeysuckle Lane, and Bentley Lane area.

Leaves should be placed on the street, next to the curb, as close to your scheduled day as possible. The Township Supervisors urge you to not put grass clippings and other debris in with leaves. Our DER Permitted Compost Facility allows only leaves to be composted.

We attempt to maintain a weekly pickup, but weather or other unforeseen factors may cause occasional biweekly pickup. A few areas of the Township are not collected on a weekly basis. Pickup in these areas is coordinated through the maintenance facility. Don't forget, you can always call the maintenance facility and make arrangements to drop off leaves. **Please remember that parking tickets will be issued during leaf collection, just as they are for street sweeping.**

Storm drains are cleared by the road crew after a storm, but these inlets may require cleaning before then. We ask for your assistance in keeping the storm inlets free of leaves and debris by moving it behind the curb line. The road crew will pick it up.

Snow Removal

If we have a repeat of last year, snow will soon be falling and the plows will

once again be clearing roadways for your safe passage. The crew always attempts to stay on the road surface itself, but it is sometimes impossible to determine exactly where the road ends and your lawn begins. You can mark your property line with reflective posts (approximately three feet high) to protect your property if you wish, but the Township will not do this for you. The Township does have a right-of-way which extends five to ten feet beyond the paved surface, so while we always do our best not to damage property, we will not be responsible for repairing any damage in the right-of-way due to snow removal. Please protect your property by marking it with reflectors.

Where There's Paving

The 1997 paving schedule includes the following streets: City Mill (from King to Betz), Betz Road, Jackson Drive, Wheatland Avenue, River Road (from Jackson to Marietta Avenue), Wilson Avenue, Abbeyville Road, Maple Avenue (from Abbeyville to West End), Atkins Avenue (Columbia Avenue to Davis), and Jennings Drive. Please be aware this is a tentative list subject to change. If you have plans for improvements to your property along the roadway, please plan the completion prior to June 1997. ■

LIMC Appoints Transportation Task Force

The Lancaster Inter-Municipal Committee is a group of 11 municipalities in Central Lancaster County which have joined together to cooperate on local government issues. The LIMC recognizes that PADOT makes only a small percentage of the highway improvements which are needed. Therefore, the LIMC has appointed a Transportation Task Force to consider the need for a transportation authority or some other new means for making additional improvements. The Task Force will investigate what activities would be most appropriate at the regional/local level, who could best accomplish these activities, what resources would be needed, and how those resources could be obtained.

The Transportation Task Force is comprised of nine elected officials from throughout the County allowing for a broad regional perspective. The group held its first meeting on August 2 and will meet frequently over the coming months with a deadline of March 1, 1997, for making its recommendations to the LIMC. NEW ROUND OF COMMUNITY GET-TOGETHERS IS SCHEDULED



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
