First Step Gathers and Disseminates Information


Members of Lancaster Township's School District Research Task Force have been hard at work collecting information from various sources, the most important being the residents. In the months since the task force was formed, several things have been accomplished:

- Township residents received a survey requesting their input on School District of Lancaster issues.
- Through their research efforts, task force members worked on becoming educated in areas such as: What are the governing bodies within the public education system? How are they comprised? What influence do they have? From what sources and in what percentages do tax dollars fund the education of Township students? What measurements are available to compare educational success, problem areas, etc.? What have other communities across the country done to improve their local schools? What are the Township's options?

- Five Community Get-Togethers, directed specifically to education, were held to hear and share Township residents feelings and thoughts on education issues in the School District of Lancaster.

Based on these efforts, the task force will provide a series of possible options to address the educational issues and concerns of residents.





Did you miss the Large Appliance Collection Day in December? If so, mark your calendar for the next one. It is your first trash pick-up day in May—Tuesday, May 6, or Wednesday, May 7. Remember to attach a blue tag to each item. A large appliance is: washer, dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer, stove, hot water heater, air conditioner, furnace, ride-on mower (**with gas removed**). Blue tags can be purchased for \$12 each at the Township office. Tires require one yellow trash tag on each tire, which are available at \$6.25 for five tags. ■

LIMC MOVES FORWARD ON CONESTOGA GREENWAYS PLAN



The Lancaster Inter-Municipal Committee (LIMC) is continuing to work on its plan for a network of greenways along or near sections of the Conestoga River, the Little Conestoga Creek, and the West Branch of the Little Conestoga Creek. The final report will be titled "Conestoga Greenways: A River Corridor Conservation Plan." It will make recommendations for greenways to conserve environmentally sensitive areas, to protect valuable scenic landscapes, and to provide recreational opportunities. Proposed greenways may be along existing roads, through existing parks or other public properties, along waterways, or elsewhere, depending on the results of the current planning program. Some greenways will be publicly accessible; others will not.

The LIMC will hold three public meetings in 1997 to present its ideas about greenways and encourage citizen comment:

- Thursday, January 23, 1997, 7:30 p.m., at Lancaster County Environmental Center, Nature's Way in Lancaster County Central Park—Review and discussion of preliminary recommendations for "Conestoga Greenways."
- Thursday, March 27, 1997, 7:30 p.m., at East Hempfield Township Office, 1700 Nissley Road, Landisville—Presentation and discussion on final draft of "Conestoga Greenways."
- Thursday, May 22, 1997, 7:30 p.m., at Maple Grove Community Center, 1420 Columbia Avenue, Lancaster—Presentation and discussion on final draft of "Conestoga Greenways."

Everyone from the LIMC area is welcome and encouraged to attend. Mark your calendars now and plan to participate in planning for the future of your community!

**Bureau of Police:
Parking Basics**



Laws for traffic control and parking are an important issue for all citizens of Lancaster Township. The Lancaster Bureau of Police Officers serving Township residents wish to

note the following important vehicle parking restrictions that apply to all motorists.

Do not park any vehicle:

- in a crosswalk.
- in front of a private driveway.
- within 15 feet of a fire hydrant.
- within 20 feet of an intersection.
- within 30 feet of a flashing signal, stop sign, yield sign, or traffic control signal.
- within 50 feet of a railroad crossing on a limited-access highway.
- upon any bridge or other elevated structure.
- within a highway tunnel.

Parking restrictions are enforced for the general safety of all Pennsylvania citizens. In addition, Lancaster Township has a number of parking restrictions that should be followed along with the above Pennsylvania-specific prohibitions. Motoring laws are meant for the safety of all citizens. Your cooperation in following the above prohibitions on parking will do much to improve the movement of traffic in the Township as well as ensure the general safety of all members of the motoring public. ■

Snow Reminders**

With winter here again, the Highway Department would like to remind Township residents of snow removal procedures, including a few tips to make things easier during this season.

PADOT maintains certain major and minor "Collector Roads." Be aware of these in Lancaster Township: Marietta Avenue, Columbia Avenue, Millersville Pike, Millersville Road, New Danville Pike, and East King Street. The Township's first priorities for snow removal are roads with emergency services, such as fire departments, hospitals, and nursing homes, as well as the other Collector Roads: East Orange Street, Riverside Avenue from East Orange to East King, Wabank Road from the city line to Millersville Road, North President Avenue, West End Avenue, School House Road, Wilson Drive between Columbia Avenue and Marietta Avenue, Atkins Avenue, Spencer Avenue, Abbey-

School District of Lancaster Updates


ville Road, Gable Park Road from Cold Stream to the Township line, and Charles Road. Local Access Road maintenance will occur after the major and minor collector roads are plowed. These roads are not mentioned above.

In addition to the regular Township road crew, independent snow removal contractors are hired to assist. Because it does take quite a while to plow every road in the Township we request your patience as well as your assistance by following some simple guidelines:

- If possible, wait to clear your driveway until after the street has been plowed. The minimum number of passes for the plow to clear a road is two, but as many as four or more passes, depending on snowfall, may be needed.
- Snow should be deposited on the side of the driveway away from the flow of traffic (see diagram). Clearing snow for a distance before your driveway allows the plow to "unload" before reaching your driveway. By piling snow away from the direction of oncoming plows, the bulk of the snow will not be pushed back onto your driveway.
- Eliminate snow piles at the driveway entrance when possible. High piles obstruct the vision of motorists exiting the driveway and prevent oncoming motorists from seeing you.
- **Please do not throw snow onto roads at any time.** This practice creates hazardous driving conditions and violates Ordinance No.3 of 1987.
- Please park all vehicles in your driveway so plows can reach to the curb line. Snow removal to the curb makes a safer roadway. It also prevents the possibility of having to shovel your driveway again because the plow has had to make another pass after the vehicle is moved from the curb.

Every effort is made to limit damage to property and mailboxes during winter road maintenance. The Township is not responsible for repairing damage in the right-of-way, which extends five to ten feet beyond the paved surface of the road. Wet, heavy snow increases the chance of damage, especially to mailboxes. Help protect your property by placing reflective markers on three-foot posts at your property line and making sure mailboxes are on sturdy, properly secured posts.

Snow and ice will cause branches to

hang lower than when they are dry. In order to keep trees and shrubbery out of the roadway, be sure to keep them trimmed back and no lower than ten feet above the roadway. The Township prefers that you take care of the trimming, but if you don't, the Township will do the trimming and may bill you for the work.

Storm drains and fire hydrants must be kept clear. The road crew clears drains after storms, but every storm drain cannot be unclogged at the same time. Please lend your assistance by shoveling and clearing debris from both. Your home may be the one you protect from fire and flooding. ■

36 to 48 inches clearance. This clearance applies to all combustible material, including the wood studs behind drywall. The Building Code provides for reductions in the standard clearances if certain measures are taken. You may call the office at 291-1213, ext. 307, for information on this or any other building safety issue. ■


Permits, Not Endorsements

From time to time the Board of Supervisors issues permits for canvassing and solicitation in order to keep track of these kinds of activities in the Township. However, the issuance of a permit is in no way an endorsement or recommendation of the product or service. Lancaster Township does not sponsor these activities nor should residents feel obligated to participate.

Building Department: Burning Issues

As the temperatures drop, the demand for heat increases. Many people rely on wood-burning stoves for a supplemental, if not primary, heating source. Before using yours this year, be sure to examine your chimney for deposits. If necessary, be sure to properly clean the flue prior to lighting that fire. Also remember to clear away all combustible material from around your stove. Generally, a solid-fuel-burning appliance requires a minimum of

warmer place, please make arrangements for your sidewalk to be maintained throughout the winter. If you're maintaining your own sidewalk, remember to take your time while shoveling and don't overexert yourself. The Township Property Maintenance Code, Section 303.3, requires that all sidewalks be kept in a proper state of repair and maintained free of hazardous conditions. Ice and snow are hazardous conditions which, if left unattended, can result in a fine of up to \$1,000. So let's keep the sidewalks clear and clean! ■



HYPOTHERMIA KILLS

Hypothermia is an abnormally low internal body temperature, 95 degrees F or less. During these cold winter months it's important to be aware of the signs, especially with children and older adults. It is sometimes difficult to recognize hypothermia since the symptoms can be similar to other illnesses such as diabetic coma, stroke, or heart disease. The major symptoms to look for are confusion, disorientation, or reduced mental clarity. As body temperature falls,

these symptoms become progressively worse. What to do? Wrap the victim in warm blankets, being sure to cover the head and neck. **Do not rub or massage any body parts; do not immerse in water; do not give alcohol, drugs, or stimulants; do not raise the legs or place hot water bottle on feet.** If the body temperature is 95 degrees or less, take the victim to the hospital immediately. Be alert to the signs with children and neighbors, especially those living alone. ■

New Emergency Management Coordinator Offers Important Tips

Lancaster Township has a new Emergency Management Coordinator. Michael F. Pickard was voted in at the Supervisors meeting on October 14, 1996. Mike has already "gotten his feet wet" with all the rainy weather and flooding that hit the Township this past fall. He has provided the following useful information as we settle into winter.

1 Help us find you.

When there is a need for emergency services—fire, police, or ambulance—the first thing one worries about is "When will they get here?" But the most important question to ask is "Can they find me?" Be sure your street number is visible from the street.

Lancaster Township Property Maintenance Code, Section 304.2, requires each structure (to which a street number has been assigned) to have its number displayed in a position easily seen and readable from the public right-of-way. All numbers are to be in Arabic numerals at least 3 inches high and 1/2 inch wide. Try this simple test: while in your car some evening, can you see your own numbers from the street? If you can't, neither can emergency personnel. Screen or storm doors, trees or shrubs may block the visibility of these numbers. Place street numbers on **both sides** of your mailbox. If you don't have a mailbox, consider erecting an address post with numbers clearly displayed and high enough so as not to be obscured by snow or leaf piles. When you do call for emergency services, have someone stand outside to flag them down. Do not stand in a window and wave your arms. Odds are you won't be seen. Call a neighbor for help if necessary.

2 Let there be light. Keep outside lights on all night! This not only helps illuminate your house and street numbers in case of emergencies but also helps deter would-be vandals or thieves from choosing your home for their place of business. A simple device can be purchased at home centers which automatically turns on your lights at dusk and off at sunrise. These devices screw into the light bulb socket and then you screw the light bulb into the device. No wiring needed! There are also timing devices available. By taking the time to set up your outside lighting, you can be assured these lights will turn on and off automatically, whether or not you are at home.

3 Mark fire hydrants.

Lancaster Township, in conjunction with the Lancaster Township and Lafayette Fire Departments, are investigating the feasibility of installing markers on all fire hydrants in the Township. The hydrant marker is a five-foot-high wand that bolts directly to the hydrant. It allows for quickly locating fire hydrants during winter months when hydrants can be hidden under snow or behind snow banks. The markers will be removed in spring. The two fire companies who serve Lancaster Township have volunteered their time and manpower to attach them to the fire hydrants. If you see these committed volunteers performing this task, it would be a great time to thank them for their dedication and the service they perform for all of us at no charge. We are still asking for your assistance in removing the snow from around hydrants so it is immediately accessible in the event of a fire. Many of you have done this in the past and it is greatly appreciated. ■
