## 2014 Reorganization Meeting

# NEW TOWNSHIP OFFICERS ELECTED

**N**ew officers were elected at the annual reorganization meeting held Monday, January 6, 2014. Kathy Wasong was elected chair of the board of supervisors, while Benjamin H. Bamford was elected to the position of vice-chair. Congratulations are in order for Thomas H. Schaller, who was reelected by township residents last fall for another six-year term. Tom was elected as treasurer to the board.

The budget passed at the supervisors meeting in December 2013 included a significant increase in the road repair budget. With no tax increase for 12

## Free E-reading at Lancaster Public Library!

**E**veryone knows that the Lancaster Public Library has thousands and thousands of books, but did you know they also have e-books, e-readers, and e-magazines?

The library's OverDrive-powered digital catalog offers almost 3,000 eBooks and around 1,500 audiobooks—available 24 hours a day, anywhere in the world with Internet and your library card. You can borrow a book or place a hold on an item for later. Don't have your own e-reader? The library even has Kindles that you can borrow!

As of 2013 you can also access digital magazines through Zinio. Once your account is set up (the library staff can help with that) you can browse, subscribe, and download any of around 50 popular magazines to your computer, tablet, or smartphone. The option to subscribe to a publication will let you know when the new issue is available so you can download it right away.

A lot of people are surprised to learn they can get the full text of thousands of magazines and journals through our periodical databases. This valuable

service has been available for years, and because it's available online it can be a lifesaver for the procrastinating student.

**ORDINANCE REMINDER**



**Lancaster Township adopted an ordinance** in 1990 whereas all landowners within the township are required to have their trash picked up by the contractor hired by the township. Exceptions are apartment buildings with four or more units and businesses (does not include in-home occupations). Those exempt from the township trash service are still required to have a licensed LCSWM-approved hauler pick up their trash. Under this ordinance, recycling is mandatory for all residents including apartment dwellers and businesses within the township. Apartment owners are to provide trash removal and recycling opportunities for their tenants. It is the landlord's responsibility to inform their tenants of any ordinances the township has that may affect them. ■

LIMITED TO THREE 32-GALLON TRASHCANS OR BAGS PER WEEK, NO MORE THAN 30 LBS. EACH. ADDITIONAL CANS OR BAGS MUST HAVE A YELLOW TAG (\$1.25) ON EACH. CANS/BAGS WEIGHING MORE THAN 30 LBS, OR OVERSIZED ITEMS (E.G. SOFA, MATTRESS, CARPET) MUST HAVE A \$4 RED TAG ATTACHED, AND PUT OUT WITH YOUR TRASH. PURCHASE TAGS AT THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE. BULK ITEMS TOO HEAVY TO BE LIFTED INTO A TRUCK BY TWO PEOPLE WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. NO CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS WILL BE COLLECTED. ■

**RECYCLE MORE!**



**M**ore recycling means bigger recycling containers! Now, 25-gallon recycling bins are available. They may be purchased for \$10 at the township office. Increased costs for recycling containers have made it necessary for us to charge for these items; we are no longer able to provide them for free. If yours becomes damaged, duct tape will make it last longer. You may also use a container of your choice. **Be sure the word RECYCLING is visible** to the hauler so it isn't mistaken for trash.

You may place an unlimited amount of recycling in your container. All bottles and cans must be thoroughly cleaned before placing them in the recycling container. Remove caps and lids, but it is okay to leave on labels and neck rings. Break down boxes as flat as possible. Bundle all cardboard that does not fit into the recycling bin. If weather calls for rain, keep your paper recyclables until the next week. Wet paper is difficult to process.

Acceptable items include:

**Metal:** aluminum beverage cans, steel food and beverage cans, aerosol cans, paint cans

**Plastic:** #1 through #7 (soda/water bottles, milk jugs, etc.)

**Glass:** clear, brown, blue, green, glass food and beverage containers

**Paper, paperboard, cardboard:** Recycle any size, any quantity. All sizes of cardboard boxes, clean pizza boxes, food boxes, empty paper towel and toilet paper rolls, tissue boxes, office paper (any color), shredded paper (placed in clear plastic bags), newspapers and inserts, magazines, catalogs, brochures, envelopes, junk mail, paper bags, phone books and other softcover books.

**Covered Devices Recycling Act**

Effective January 24, 2013, the following items may no longer be placed at curbside or included with trash: desktop computers/laptops, monitors, keyboards and mouse, printers, speakers, TVs, and e-readers. These items must be taken to LCSWMA, 1299 Harrisburg Pike. ■

**Large Appliance & Tire Collection**

is scheduled for the week of April 14 to 17 on your regular trash collection day. Large appliances include washers, dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, stoves, freezers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, furnaces, dehumidifiers, etc. A \$12 blue tag must be purchased and attached to each appliance. Items too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted. Each tire requires a \$2 purple tag, and tires must be removed from their rims. No commercial truck tires will be accepted. Tags are purchased at the township office. If you already have a tag, please call 291-1213 to place your address and item(s) on the collection list. ■



**Trash & Recycling Bills**

SEMIANNUAL TRASH AND RECYCLING BILLS WILL BE MAILED APRIL 1 AND ARE DUE APRIL 30. THE FEE IS \$102.00 FOR SIX MONTHS. SENIORS AGED 60 OR OLDER ARE ELIGIBLE FOR A 10% DISCOUNT. THAT RATE IS \$91.80 FOR SIX MONTHS. BRING ID TO THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE FOR THE DISCOUNTED RATE. ■

**2014 Road Maintenance**

Lancaster Township makes every effort to keep our roads and streets in good repair. They are inspected frequently and, based on those inspections and average traffic flow, the roads to be repaved are chosen. The following will be repaved this summer 2014. This is a preliminary list; some of the streets could be put on hold due to budgetary constraints.

- School House Rd. the entire length
- Nassau Rd. the entire length
- Atkins Ave. the entire length
- Alley E (between Clark St. and Riverside Ave.)
- Alley D (from Ranck Ave. to dead end)

**Time to Think about Yard/Woody Waste**

Yard/woody waste drop-off begins Monday, March 31 (3PM to 7PM) at the facility on 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. Days and hours of operation are Monday–Thursday, 3PM to 7PM, until November 3 when the hours will be 2PM to 5PM. **Closed Fridays.** The once-a-month Saturday drop-off begins April 5; the first Saturday of each month through November 1, 9AM to Noon. Bio-bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit.

This service is for township residents only. Please have ID ready for the gate attendant who will also inspect your load for contaminants and point out the proper place to unload. No contractors will be admitted.

Yard/woody waste also will be collected by Penn Waste every other week beginning the week of April 7 and ending the week of October 6.

**How to prepare yard waste**

Yard/woody waste is material such as tree trimmings, shrubbery, and other organic landscape vegetation. Place the waste in bio-bags or bundle it with

biodegradable twine. Bundles may not be longer than 4' in length, exceed 6" in diameter, and weigh more than 30 lbs each. Bundles must be placed at the curb on your scheduled pick-up day before 6:30AM. An unlimited number of bags or bundles may be placed at the curb. **Yard waste in plastic bags WILL NOT be collected.**


**DO NOT** place the following items out for yard waste collection: grass clippings, fruit and vegetables, tree stumps, dirt, and stones.

**Street Sweeping News**

Street sweeping on sign-posted streets will resume **Tuesday, April 8.** Warning tickets will be issued during the first two sweeping weeks. Starting this year, we will be sweeping our signed streets the first and third full weeks of the month rather than every week. All street sweeping signs will be modified reflecting this change. Tickets with fines will be issued beginning May 6.

It has been noted that, for the most part, residents try to keep the street in front of their property free of litter and debris, helping to make the biweekly sweeping decision an easy one. The biweekly sweeping schedule also will

allow us to clean our other nonsigned neighborhoods more frequently. Please read the signs and move your vehicle. The township wants to clean and maintain our streets; a vehicle parked illegally prevents completion of the job. Any questions as to which Tuesday or Wednesday we will be sweeping can be answered with a phone call to the township office or a glance at our township website.

**Street/Alley Tree Policy**

The property owner is responsible for the care and pruning of all trees and shrubs along any street or township maintained alley, whether in or out of the right-of way. This past winter some township alleys were not plowed in a timely fashion because of snow weight on trees and shrubs, thus blocking access for our plowing equipment. This year we will take an aggressive approach to removing and trimming trees/bushes in township-maintained alleys.

Most of our alleys have a 14-foot right-of-way width that must be clear of any fences, vegetation, or objects. Check your property! If you have right-of-way encroachment, please remove it, or we will. A minimum distance of 14 feet must be maintained between the road surface and the lowest overhanging branch above the street. Smaller trees and shrubs should be pruned to allow signs to be clearly seen, as well as visible at intersections.

The township reserves the right to do any necessary pruning if the property owner fails to maintain trees, bushes, or other plantings. If a tree or limb falls and blocks a street, it is the responsibility of the property owner to clean up the tree and remove any debris after reopening of the roadway. ■

**Lancaster Township to Adopt a Dumpster Ordinance**

As part of an updated streets and sidewalk ordinance, the township will adopt regulations concerning the use and placement of dumpsters in the public right-of-way. As the primary purpose of public streets is for use by vehicular and pedestrian traffic, reasonable regulation of obstruction in public streets and sidewalks is necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the general public.

Prior to the issuance of any permit for any temporary dumpster or portable storage device, its location and usage shall be reviewed and approved by the township. A permit for a temporary dumpster or portable storage device

shall be for an initial term of not more than 14 days. The permit fee is \$20.

There are several restrictions regarding their placement that include prohibited areas such as fire hydrants and distances from intersections. There are more, so be sure to read the permit application carefully. The ordinance is all about public safety, so there are provisions that call for sufficient reflective tape to ensure dumpsters are visible at night and restrict how far they may extend into the street.

No permit is required for dumpsters or portable storage devices that are placed safely on private property; however, time restrictions are similar. The permit application can be found online at the township website by clicking on Forms on the home page, or at the township office. ■

**STORMWATER AND MS4**

**M**S4 stands for Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, and is quickly becoming a concern for all of us. Stormwater runoff is a fact of life. How we deal with stormwater runoff requires everyone's involvement.

Here are just a few ways you can help:

- **Plant trees and other native vegetation to promote water infiltration.** If your property borders a stream, plant trees along its banks. Trees help to stabilize the banks and filter excess nutrients from the water.
- **Compost grass clippings.** They are a natural source of fertilizer for your lawn.
- **Reduce energy and fuel consumption.** Power plants and cars are a significant source of atmospheric nitrogen, which is deposited on land by rainfall and then into the local water ways and the Bay.
- **Do not connect sump pumps, cellar drains or roof drains to the sanitary sewer system.** Modern sanitary sewers are not designed to handle storm water. Storm water can overwhelm a sanitary sewer system and potentially cause sewer overflows.
- **Minimize use of the garbage disposal; compost kitchen waste instead.** This reduces the burden on sewer systems, and the compost is a good source of fertilizer for gardens. ■


## PROJECT CHILDSAFE OFFERING FREE GUNLOCKS

The Manheim Township Police Department participates in Project Childsafe, a national initiative funded by the U.S. Department of Justice and the firearms industry to protect our youth by distributing gunlocks free of charge. The cable-style locks will fit most types of handguns, rifles, and shotguns. The gunlock kit contains two keys and a safety booklet. Everyone with firearms in their residence is urged to take advantage of this offer in order to keep your loved ones safe and prevent accidental or unauthorized discharges of your firearms. These locks are available to all residents on a first-come, first-served basis. See an officer if you are interested.

### Anonymous Crime Tip Line

The department also wishes to remind all residents about our anonymous crime tip line which is to be used to report drug activity, information on known criminals, and ongoing criminal activity. The number, (717) 569-2816, is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is completely anonymous. The police are aware that people are sometimes reluctant to report criminal activity because they don't want their identity known. This line allows residents, including young people, to get involved without the criminals knowing who they are. The call goes directly into a recorded message line, which is not attached to any form of caller ID. Callers should leave a detailed message about the reason for their call, including the names of people involved (if known), locations of the persons, where the incident is occurring, and dates and times of the occurrences. You may leave any other information that would be helpful in the investigation and apprehension of a criminal. This phone line should not be used to request an immediate response from an officer. For an emergency or in-progress crime, dial 911.

### Let's Talk About Fire Safety

**E**ach year more than 4,000 Americans die and more than 25,000 are injured in fires, many of which could have been prevented. To protect yourself, know how to prevent fires and prepare ahead of time.

#### What to do during a fire:

- Fire spreads quickly! There is no time to gather valuables or make a phone call. Get out immediately!



- Plan two escape routes from every room in your house and make sure everyone in the family is aware. With your family, practice escaping from

every room. Consider escape ladders for upper-level rooms. Pick a place outside of the home to meet.

- Make sure windows and doors are not painted or nailed shut.
- Stay low to the floor when escaping from a fire. If clothes catch on fire: STOP, DROP, AND ROLL!
- Inspect electrical wiring and extension cords for frayed or exposed wires. Make sure extension cords and outlets are not overloaded.

- Never use gasoline, benzene, or other flammable liquids inside.

- Place smoke alarms on every level of the house and test them once a month. Replace batteries twice a year.

- Keep matches and lighters up high and away from children.

Install fire extinguishers

in the house and teach all family members how to use them.

- Never smoke in bed! ■
