BUDGET APPROVED WITH NO TAX INCREASE

Lancaster Township experiences many of the challenges that other municipalities face, such as increased costs to deliver services and an eroding tax base. We have traditionally taken a conservative approach to our finances—your tax dollars. Due to prudent management, we did not have to raise taxes, and remain at .6 mills for 2015. Further, while the news in general is bleak regarding pension funding, our pension is fully funded.

In order to gain greater clarity on our finances going forward, we entered into a new police services agreement with Manheim Township. We extended our agreement and added more detective services. At the same time, we have greater control over expenses for budgetary purposes. As we have heard from residents, the Manheim Township Police provide outstanding community policing in our township. Did you know that in January 2015 they responded to 475 complaints in our township with a clearance rate of 71%?

We can also be thankful for the dedicated members of the Lancaster Township VOLUNTEER fire department. These highly trained UNPAID men and women put their lives on the line daily for every member of this township and through mutual aid to other municipalities. In January alone, they responded to 55 calls. To further strengthen an already strong organization, the fire department and the township are together rewriting fire department bylaws, streamlining finances, and developing programs that will attract the next generation of dedicated individuals who will protect the lives and property of the residents of Lancaster Township. ■

Stormwater Management

Stormwater runoff is generated when rain or melting snow flows across unpaved areas and does not seep into the ground. As it goes along, it accumulates debris, chemicals, and other pollutants that affect water quality. Residents can help reduce stormwater contamination by minimizing the use of fertilizers and sweeping up any residue that lands on sidewalks or driveways, never pouring anything into storm drains and keeping storm drains free of debris, directing downspouts to grassy areas, checking for vehicle engine leaks, and cleaning up all pet waste. ■

SINKHOLES AND INSURANCE

Sinkholes are a natural part of Pennsylvania's landscape. They can appear suddenly, without warning, and cause drastic problems for homeowners. If your home is destroyed by a sinkhole and you do not have a sinkhole insurance policy, you may not receive any compensation for your loss. Many insurance policies (homeowners, renters, vehicle) offer special endorsements for sinkhole coverage. While there's no clear way to predict if, when, or where a sinkhole will occur on your property, the best way to prepare is to have sufficient and proper insurance coverage. Call your insurance agent and ask about sinkhole coverage before disaster strikes. ■

► **Covered Devices Recycling Act**

As of January 24, 2013, the following items may not be placed at curbside or included with your trash: desktop computers/laptops, monitors, keyboards and mouse, printers, speakers, TVs, and e-readers. They must be taken to LCSWMA's HHW facility, 1299 Harrisburg Pike.


► **Large Appliance & Tire Collection**

...IS SCHEDULED FOR THE WEEK OF APRIL 13 TO 16 ON YOUR REGULAR TRASH COLLECTION DAY. LARGE APPLIANCES INCLUDE WASHERS, DRYERS, DISHWASHERS, REFRIGERATORS, STOVES, FREEZERS, HOT WATER HEATERS, AIR CONDITIONERS, FURNACES, DEHUMIDIFIERS, ETC. A **\$12 blue tag** MUST BE PURCHASED AND ATTACHED TO EACH APPLIANCE. ITEMS TOO HEAVY TO BE LIFTED INTO A TRUCK BY TWO PEOPLE WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

EACH TIRE REQUIRES A **\$2 purple tag**.

AND TIRES MUST BE REMOVED FROM THEIR RIMS. NO COMMERCIAL TRUCK TIRES WILL BE ACCEPTED. TAGS ARE PURCHASED AT THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE.

KEEP A LID ON IT!



Residents are asked to always use lids on trash cans. Keeping a lid on the trash will lesson the chance of birds and other animals spreading it around the neighborhood.

Reminder—55-gallon barrels, or any barrel without handles, are unacceptable trash containers. They present a safety hazard to the Penn Waste crew and cannot be picked up. Proper trash containers need to have handles.

CALLING ALL CARTONS!

Penn Waste is now accepting cartons for recycling. There are two types—shelf-stable and refrigerated. Shelf-stable examples are juice, milk, soy milk, soup/broth, and wine. Refrigerated examples are milk, juice, cream, egg substitutes.

Recycling your carton is easy:

1. Remove caps or straws.
2. Empty and rinse out the carton.
3. Place cartons in your recycle bin with all your other recyclable materials.



Illegal dumping of any regulated material is a punishable offense. Lancaster Township will enforce all regulations and impose penalties on violators.

► **Trash & Recycling Bills**

Semi-annual trash/recycling bills will be mailed April 1 and due April 30. The fee is \$102 for six months. Seniors aged 60 or older are eligible for a 10% discount, or \$91.80 for six months. Bring your ID to the township office for the discounted rate.

Lancaster Township adopted an ordinance in 1990 whereas all landowners within the township are required to have their trash picked up by the contractor hired by the township. Exceptions are apartment buildings with four or more units and businesses (excluding in-home occupations). Those that are exempt from being on the township trash service are still required to have a licensed LCSWMA approved hauler to pick up their trash.

Under the same ordinance, recycling is mandatory for all residents, including apartment dwellers and businesses within the township. Apartment owners are to provide trash removal/recycling opportunities for their tenants. It is the landlord's responsibility to inform their tenants of any township ordinances that may affect them.



Planning & Zoning

Soliciting in Lancaster Township

In December of 2010, the Lancaster Township Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance 2010-06, which sets the township policies and procedures for any company or individual who wishes to solicit in the township. This was done for the safety and well-being of residents while providing for those law-abiding people and businesses who have the right to do so. ANYONE who wishes to solicit MUST first apply for and receive a permit from the township. Exceptions are officers or employees of the township, county, state, or federal government and charitable, religious, or nonprofit organizations.

Canvassing may only occur during the hours of 5:00pm to 8:00pm, Monday through Friday, and noon to 8:00pm, Saturday and Sunday. The signed permit must be carried at all times. Photo identification is required. No "hard-sell" tactics will be tolerated. Any infraction can mean immediate revocation of the permit, and failure to secure the required permit could result in a \$500 fine for each violation.

Very important things to remember when someone approaches your home:

1. Never open your door to a stranger.



▲ ALL SOLICITORS MUST HAVE A PERMIT.

2. Do not allow yourself to be "bullied" by anyone who wants access to your home.
3. Ask for ID from anyone who wishes to discuss anything with you.
4. If you feel threatened in any way, call the police emergency number 911. Call the non-emergency number at (717) 664-1180 to report unusual behavior or someone soliciting without a permit. We want to know who these people are.

The majority of people operating in the township do so legally and respectfully. The people and companies doing so actually welcome questions and are happy to provide documentation. However, there are people whose only concern is for themselves, so we must remain wary of the tactics employed by anyone approaching our homes. ■

Freegal® is available through the library's website. To use the service, all you need is your library card number. There is no software to download. Yard Waste Collection Begins April 6

Penn Waste begins yard waste collection the week of April 6 and continues through the week of October 5. Collection includes leaves, garden residue, brush, shrubbery trimmings, and small branches less than 2" in diameter. Yard waste bags will be available at the Public Works Facility, 1357 Meadowcreek Lane, starting Monday, April 6. Yard waste is collected every other week. Please put your bag at the curb only when it is full.

Fill bags to the indicated line and then fold or smash in the bag. Twigs and branches sticking out from the bag may cause injury to the haulers when loading them into the truck. Loaders have the right to leave bags if not filled properly. Larger branches 3" or more in diameter must be cut into 3-foot lengths and bundled. Place bundles next to your yard waste bags.

Grass is not permitted in yard waste bags. The most environmentally beneficial option is to leave grass clippings on the lawn. As clippings decompose they act as a natural fertilizer filtering down to the soil where it reduces water evaporation and encourages new growth. ■

2015 Road Maintenance

Lancaster Township makes every effort to keep our roads and streets in good repair. They are inspected frequently and, based on those inspections and average traffic flow, the roads to be repaved are chosen. The following is a preliminary list of streets to be repaved during summer 2015. Some streets could be put on hold due to budgetary constraints.

- **North President Ave.**—Marietta Ave. to Columbia Ave.
- **Wilson Dr.**—Columbia Ave. to Marietta Ave.
- **Nassau Rd.**—entire length
- **Hamilton Rd.**—Valley Rd. to Hillcrest Rd.
- **Alley H**—N. President Ave. to Woods Ave.
- **Alley X**—Hamilton Park Dr. to Maple Ave.
- **Alley W**—Spring Grove Ave. to Hamilton Park Dr. (between Atkins and Spencer)

Street Sweeping

Street sweeping will resume on April 1. Sweeping on “signed streets” will take place the first and third Tuesday and the first and third Wednesday of each month, starting on April 1. Warning tickets will be issued during the first two sweeping weeks. **Tickets with fines will be issued beginning May 5.**

Residents who keep the street in front

of their property free of litter and debris make biweekly sweeping easier. The faster it goes, the more frequently we can sweep the nonsigned neighborhoods. Please read the signs and move your vehicle accordingly. The township wants to clean and maintain our streets. A vehicle parked illegally prevents completion of the job.

Street/Alley Tree Policy

Property owners are responsible for the care and pruning of all trees and shrubs along any street or township-maintained alley, whether in or out of the right-of-way. This past winter some township alleys were very difficult to plow as a result of overgrown trees, bushes, and hedges. This overgrowth can cause plow equipment to break off branches and damage right-of-way plantings. It can also damage the equipment, and is dangerous for the operator. This year we will take an aggressive approach to removing and trimming trees and bushes in our township-maintained alleys. **Most of our alleys have a 14-foot right-of-way width that must be clear of fences, vegetation, and objects.** Check your property! If you have right-of-way encroachment, please remove it.

A minimum distance of 14 feet must be maintained between the road surface and the lowest overhanging branch.

Prune smaller trees and shrubs to allow signs to be clearly seen, as well as visible at intersections. The township reserves the right to do any necessary pruning if the property owner fails to maintain trees, bushes, or other plantings.

If a tree or tree limb falls and blocks a township road or alley, the Public Works Department will attempt to move or remove it in order to open the road for the safe passage of vehicles. If the fallen tree or branch is too large for public works to handle, the road or alley will be closed. The property owner will then have 24 hours to call a tree-removal contractor.

It is the property owner’s responsibility to hire a private contractor to remove the tree and all debris so the road or alley can be reopened. If the property owner does not arrange for timely removal of the tree, or cannot be reached, the township will have the obstruction removed by a contractor, and the property owner will be billed for that service.

Yard/Woody Waste Drop-off

Yard/woody waste drop-off begins Monday, April 6, at the public works maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. Days and hours of operation are Monday–Thursday, 3:00pm to 7:00pm, until November 2 when the hours will change to 2:00pm to 5:00pm. **Closed all Fridays.**

The once-a-month Saturday drop-off begins May 2 and continues the first Saturday of each month through November 7, 9:00am to noon. Bio-bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit.

This service is for township residents only. Please have ID ready for the gate attendant, who will inspect your load for contaminants and point out the proper place to unload. **No contractors will be admitted.**

Mulch and Compost

Mulch and compost will be available for hand loading from the area near the cardboard recycling dumpster Monday through Thursday from 7:00am to 7:00pm and Friday from 7:00am to 3:00pm. All mulch and compost will be FREE to Lancaster Township residents while supplies last. Mulch or compost will be loaded Monday through Thursday from 3:00–4:00pm and the first Saturday of each month from 9:00am to noon until June 6. After June 6, please call 293-1733 to check on availability and for loading times. **No contractors will be serviced.**

Summer camp registration is in full swing! Register your child now for one of our four great summer camps. We also offer Summer Preschool for little ones ages 3-5.





Lancaster Township Fire Department (LTFD) New Engine Update



The new Pierce Arrow XT fire engine approved by the Lancaster Township Board of Supervisors has been progressing along the assembly line at the Pierce Manufacturing plant in Appleton, Wisconsin. The new engine's cab, chassis, pump house, and body have been assembled.

Fire Chief Ron Comfort Jr. and Deputy Chief Glenn Usdin visited the facility to perform a pre-final inspection of the engine during the assembly process to verify that it conforms to contract specifications and identify any construction imperfections. The chiefs addressed a few items that required attention after their inspection. With the additional alterations, delivery is still expected early to mid-2015.

After the new engine arrives, Engine 66-3, a 1992 Spartan/American La France that is housed in the North Station in Hamilton Park, will be sold. Residents can follow the assembly progress of the new engine on the fire department's website at LTFD.org.


