## Fourth Annual Community Day: Come and Join the Fun!

**Y**es, it's the Fourth Lancaster Township Annual Community Day at Maple Grove Park and Community Building, 1420 Columbia Avenue. Those who have attended the event in the past know what a fun-filled family day it is! If you haven't made it to previous events, here's some of what you've been missing!

- **Lancaster Township Fire Department and Lafayette Fire Company** volunteers will be showing off their emergency equipment. Get a bird's-eye view 70 feet in the air from the ladder truck, try your hand with the water hose on the pumper truck, go for a fire engine ride, have a look at the water rescue display, and send the kids through the smoke trailer.
- **The Police Department** will have a cruiser, motorcycle, and patrol bike on display, the Special Emergency Response Team (SERT) will give a demonstration of their specialized abilities, and the canine patrol and mounted police will also show off their distinct skills.
- **LEMSA** will demonstrate their capabilities with displays of their emergency and life-saving equipment.
- **The Lancaster Township Historical Commission (LTHC)** has planned an extremely interesting historical look at

the Township. Their tent will be filled with displays of old pictures and maps. Volunteers in costume will explain the exhibits, which include a Conestoga Wagon, and a vintage car show that will be held in Stonemill Plaza. Your contributions would be most welcome. Old pictures, maps, written or taped memories and stories are being sought. If you can contribute items, please call the office at 291-1213 and ask for Marti or Lynn. Copies of all will be made with the unharmed originals being returned to the owners. Residents can also fill out a *resource inventory* form. This will help the LTHC to inventory and categorize the components that make up our Township and chronicle it for future generations.

- **Lancaster Recreation Commission (LRC)** will host an assortment of games with prizes for the children. There will be face painting, pumpkin decorating, birdfeeder and scarecrow making. Patty

the Clown will make balloon figures, a magician will amaze with feats of prestidigitation, and the Keynote Address, a barbershop quartet, will serenade residents. Other entertainment includes the LRC Senior Ensemble, bands, and dance groups.

- **The Pennsylvania Fish and Game Commission** will offer hands-on fishing seminars in the Little Conestoga Creek and a wildlife display. Children can learn safe bicycling by riding along a supervised safety course (bikes and helmets provided). A hayride through natural areas will be guided and narrated by Lancaster County Parks and Recreation employees and includes a trip through the Township Maintenance Facility for a look at various road equipment.

If all of this leaves you hungry and thirsty, fear not, the LRC Happy Hours Club will have food and beverages on sale at the Community Building. ■

# Big Changes in Trash Collection

The red trucks are coming! Lancaster Township's current refuse and recycling contract expires at the end of September. In June, bids were submitted for a new contract and in July, the Lancaster Township Board of Supervisors awarded the low bid contract to Lebanon Farms Disposal, Inc. (LFD) effective September 30, 2002.

Changes will occur with the new contract. Refuse and recyclables will be collected four days a week, Monday through Thursday. The Township has been divided into four sections with each section assigned a separate collection day. The changes will help to eliminate missed pickups as well as give the new trash haulers adequate time to perform their job effectively. Please refer to the chart and map to find your collection day. See a summary of the new program is on page 3.

The Township has been able to keep refuse fees among the lowest in the county. Effective October 1, fees will increase to \$65 per six months. A 10% discount is given to senior citizens (age 60 and over) with proper identification.

Residents need to be aware of a significant change in the recycling program in Lancaster Township. LFD

will now be collecting and **recycling all garden and yard waste** including branches, twigs, bush trimmings, grass, weeds, and sod. The change will bring Lancaster Township into compliance with the PA Department of Environmental Protection, Act 101 regulations. Collection of these materials will occur twice a month during the months of April through October. Green tags will no longer be sold for this type of collection. Instead, biodegradable kraft bags must be used; they are available for purchase at the rate of two for \$1.00. Residents may still bundle brush and sticks (up to two inches in diameter) to place out for collection at no charge. All other yard waste must be placed in biodegradable bags. LFD will collect these materials on your scheduled day only during the week of October 14. *Future dates will be published here when collection resumes in the spring.*

Please call the office at 291-1213 if you have any questions concerning the new refuse and recycling program. A few glitches are expected. Your understanding and patience are requested as everyone, including Lebanon Farms Disposal, becomes familiar with the program. ■



## MONDAY COLLECTION

East of Lancaster City, south of Lancaster City, to and including the east side of Bean Hill Road, also includes all of Second Lock Road south to New Danville Pike. **Wabank Road addresses are excluded.**

## TUESDAY COLLECTION

South side of Millersville Pike (Route 999), to and including Wabank Road east of Lancaster City to Millersville Road (Route 741), also includes the west side of Bean Hill Road.

**Millersville Road (Route 741) addresses are excluded.**

Areas and developments included in Tuesday refuse/recycling collection:

**Even numbered addresses on Bean Hill Road, even numbered addresses on Millersville Pike (route 999), Bausman, Chadwick development, Gable Park, and Windolph Landing**

## WEDNESDAY COLLECTION

South side of Elm Avenue, to and including the north side of Millersville Pike (Route 999), also includes Millersville Road (Route 741) area west of Lancaster City. **S. West End Avenue addresses located north of Elm Avenue are excluded.**

Areas and developments included in Wednesday refuse/recycling collection:

**Even numbered addresses on Elm Avenue, Hamilton Park area south of Elm Avenue, Abbeyville Manor, Canterbury, Millrace, Honeysuckle, and old Wabank Road**

## THURSDAY COLLECTION

North side of Elm Avenue to Newton Road west of Lancaster City.

Areas and developments included in Thursday refuse/recycling collection:

**Odd numbered addresses on Elm Avenue, Hamilton Park area north of Elm Avenue, Woodlawn, and School Lane Hills**



## Drought Emergency Continues

Lancaster County and a significant portion of the state are still in a drought emergency. Governor Mark Schweiker has extended the proclamation of February 12, 2002 declaring a drought emergency for another 90 days from August 11, 2002. **WATER RESTRICTIONS INCLUDE:**

- X BANNED:** vehicle washing unless using a bucket
- X BANNED:** watering of lawns, gardens, trees, shrubs, athletic fields, golf courses
- X BANNED:** washing down driveways, sidewalks, patios, other outside surfaces
- X BANNED:** using water for fountains, waterfalls, other ornamental purposes
- X BANNED:** restaurants automatically serving water

**FINES:** \$200 first offense, up to \$500 for subsequent offenses. ## Large Appliance Pickup

will be held the first week of December on your regular trash pickup day, December 2, 3, 4, 5. You must notify the office of what item(s) are to be collected and each item must have a Blue Tag attached (Purple for tires).

## Holiday Trash Collection:

Thursday pickup will be Friday

**Christmas Day, December 25:**  
Monday & Tuesday pickup remains the same, Wednesday pickup will be Thursday, Thursday pickup will be Friday

**New Year's Day, January 1, 2003:**  
Monday & Tuesday pickup remains the same; Wednesday pickup will be Thursday, Thursday pickup will be Friday

**Remember:** The limit is three (3) bags or containers per week, including holidays. Plan ahead for extra trash by purchasing extra service tags. Tags may be purchased in person, or by mailing a check.

## New Trash Program Overview

- New fees: \$65/6 months (10% discount to senior citizens age 60+)
- 3 refuse containers/bags each week; yellow extra service tags for anything over 3 bags/containers; \$6.25/5 tags.
- Red tags for oversized items (between 30 and 125 pounds); 2 red tagged items allowed per week; \$4/each.
- Newspapers must be tied in bundles or placed in paper bags.
- Only glass bottles and jars, aluminum cans, plastic food and beverage containers with the recycling code 1 (PET) or 2 (HDPE) are to be placed in the recycling bin.
- Large appliances and tires are collected twice a year with the next pickup occurring during the first week of December on your regular pickup day; a Township form must be completed for collection of these items; \$12 blue appliance tag for each item; \$1.25 purple tag for each tire.
- Yard waste collection will be on your regular pickup day the week of October 14; brush and sticks (maximum two inches in diameter) must be tied in bundles and are collected for free; all other garden and yard waste must be in biodegradable bags purchased at the Township office \$1/2.
- When a holiday falls on or before your collection day, pickup will be the following day. ■

**Planning & Zoning:  
Compliant Street Numbers**

There is currently a concerted effort to bring all property street numbers into compliance with code. Lancaster Township Property Maintenance Code, Section 304.2 requires each structure to have posted street numbers. All numbers are to be at least three inches high with a stroke width of at least one-half inch, positioned for easy reading from the public right-of-way. A well-lit location is best. A color that contrasts with the background on which it is attached is recommended for easy visibility.

It may be necessary to re-number some homes in order to bring them into proper sequence with neighboring properties.

Identification of residences is of concern to the Township because of the element of safety for residents. If an emergency were to occur, the fire department, ambulance, or police cruiser personnel must be able to identify the site in order to provide emergency services as quickly as possible. It can be a matter of life and death. Don't take chances with family members — post numbers properly.

Remember, too, that fall is also the time of year to have the furnace cleaned and serviced and have screens replaced with storm windows. Further, add weatherstripping where necessary to prevent cold air leaks, and make sure the flue is free of creosote buildup to prevent fires. A professional should check your chimney to ensure it is functional and in good shape. Cracks could allow deadly carbon monoxide to seep into your home.

Lynn Stauffer, Planning and Zoning Director, or Marti Heim, Planning and Zoning Assistant, are always available for any questions or concerns you may have. Just give them a call at 291-1213. Staff is always willing to help with your planning and zoning needs. Please

remember that it is the homeowner's responsibility to obtain all necessary permits.

**Public Works: Falling Leaves**

**Leaf collection** begins Monday, October 7 and continues through Friday, December 13. Please remember, although everything possible is done to maintain the following schedule, wet and rainy weather may force a bi-weekly pick-up. **Please do not put leaves in the street prior to the start of leaf collection.** You may call 293-1733 year-round to drop off residential leaves at the Township's composting facility.

The Township does not pick up leaves on some of the busier roadways. The traffic and narrow shoulders pose an extremely hazardous situation to the public works staff. Pick up of bagged leaves on these roads can be arranged by calling the office, 291-1213.

- **Monday** – All streets between Columbia and Marietta Avenue
- **Tuesday** – Hamilton Park area follows Tuesday morning posted street cleaning schedule, as do Davis Drive, Spencer Avenue, S. President Avenue, 400 and 500 blocks of Atkins; East End follows Tuesday afternoon street cleaning schedule. Also included on this Tuesday afternoon schedule are City Mill Road, Conestoga Woods Drive, and Conestoga Boulevard.
- **Wednesday** – Hamilton Park area follows Wednesday morning posted street cleaning schedule, as does School House Road. East End will follow Wednesday afternoon posted street cleaning schedule
- **Thursday** – All streets on north side of Marietta Avenue to Newton Road

- **Friday** – West side of Abbeyville Road, Bausman area, Hoover Road, Honeysuckle Lane, Bentley Lane area  
Please place leaves on the street next to the curb as close as possible to the scheduled pick-up day.

**Storm water inlets** become clogged as leaves begin to fall. There are over 500 inlets in the Township. Residents are asked to assist by keeping them clear and placing the debris behind the inlet. Please call 293-1733 for debris pickup or when there is a problem with drainage.

**Property markers** or small flags should be placed in yards before the snow arrives. It is impossible to know where a road ends and the lawn begins when it is covered with snow, especially in non-curbed neighborhoods. Please mark the lawn edge with three- to four-foot stakes or flags to prevent damage. The Township is not responsible for repairing damage in the public right-of-way, which extends five to ten feet beyond the paved surface.

**Trees and bushes** that overhang or protrude into the street must be kept trimmed. The lowest limb on a tree must be at least 14 feet above the road surface. Keeping trees and bushes trimmed not only allows safe passage for vehicles and pedestrians, but also maintains the overall health of the plant.

Beware of Strangers



When Arc Lights Came to Lancaster

**A**s electrical streetlighting became the viable option over kerosene and illuminating gas, generating the necessary electrical power created much interest among local businessmen and venture capitalists. George B. Willson, owner of Wheatland and a real estate developer, headed a group that organized the Lancaster Electric Light, Heat, and Power Co. on February 2, 1897.

They purchased water rights on the Conestoga River and fitted out generating stations at Wabank, Slackwater, and Rock Hill. The Wabank plant in Lancaster Township utilized the site of a former gristmill near Rice Road. In 1901 the dam was rebuilt as a timber-crib structure 280 feet long and 15 feet high. It impounded water in the river 3.4 miles upstream to Second Lock dam. Three 48-inch turbines, each supplying 80 horsepower, were installed. They supplied power to a 175-kilowatt generator and a 6-kilowatt exciter. Power production was controlled by a hydraulic oil system governor.

Each of the three generating stations along the river was incorporated separately. On May 13, 1913, the Wabank plant was called the Buchanan Water & Powers Co. on the Lancaster Township side of the Conestoga River, and on the Pequea Township side it was called the Lafayette Water & Power Co. The same day the Rock Hill plant was named the Hamilton Water & Power Co. (Manor Township) and the [Thaddeus] Stevens Water & Power Co. (Conestoga Township). On June 9, the Slackwater plant, which had been a paper mill earlier, was named the Lancaster County Water & Power Co., and it became a "holding company" for the other two power plants. The Wabank plant burned in 1918.






