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‘STAKING’ THE LITTLE CONESTOGA CREEK STABILIZES STREAM BANK

On February 17, a cold Saturday afternoon, 25 volunteers made the world a better place in which to live. The group gathered at Maple Grove Park for the purpose of stabilizing the Little Conestoga Creek stream bank with natural materials. The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency awarded a Chesapeake Bay Small Watershed Grant to Lancaster Township for this very purpose.

“Live stakes” are live but dormant cuttings from trees with an approximate diameter of two inches. These are driven

deep into the stream bank where they will take hold by sending out roots and eventually growing into trees. Fascines are live cuttings of slender branches that are “knitted” together in long bundles, placed in trenches dug into the ground, and finally covered with dirt. Fascines will then take root below ground and eventually sprout bushes further anchoring and stabilizing the banks.

After a quick lesson from Dan Synoracki and Mark Metzler, both of Rettew Associates, Inc., on how to cut live stakes and materials for fascines, the group headed for Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area. There the group joined forces with James R. Binder, Manager of the Middle Creek Wildlife Management Area. Jim was most helpful in securing permission from the PA Game Commission to enter restricted areas and proceed with the gathering of live stakes and fascine material. In addition to his



assistance behind the desk, Jim was right there in the thick of things providing his knowledge and guidance along with hefting the loads.

The selfless volunteers came from all walks of life representing private citizens, environmental groups, schools, and colleges. There was a great spirit of camaraderie among the participants while slogging through mud and ice-covered waters. For over three hours, on an extremely cold and windy day, participants cheerfully went about the jobs of sawing, cutting, snipping, stripping, and tying bundles of materials for transport back to Maple Grove Park.




ANNUAL TOWNSHIP REVIEW YEAR 2000

- The Planning and Zoning Department issued 290 building and zoning permits. Of those permits, 6 were commercial zoning, 9 commercial building, 11 temporary use, 7 sign permits, 7 blasting permits, 3 home occupation, 126 residential zoning, and 120 residential building permits.
- The Zoning Hearing Board reviewed 14 cases within which there were requests for 6 special exceptions, 9 variances, and 2 appeals of notices of violations.
- The Engleside intersection islands were planted with low growing shrubs and flowers.
- The Knights of Columbus became the first group to Adopt-A-Highway in the Township.
- Overhead street signs were installed at signalized intersections as recommended in the LIMC traffic study.
- The Honeysuckle Lane sanitary sewer project was completed with connections by mid-year 2001.
- The memorial brick project at Lancaster Community Park was completed.
- New traffic signals were installed at East King Street and North/South Conestoga Drives; the addition of restricted turns at South Conestoga has resulted in a safer intersection.
- Second Lock Road was widened and repaved to improve driving safety.
- Work is progressing on the Atkins/Elwood/Spencer Avenues storm water project to provide better control of runoff in this area.
- New 25 MPH zones were established on Second Lock and City Mill Roads.
- The second annual Community Day was a great success.
- It was a busy year for Township Fire, Police, and Emergency Management Service providers. Emergency responses were:



- Lancaster Township Fire Department - 303
- Lafayette Fire Company - 80
- Police - 7,605
- EMS - 1,166
- Total: 9,154 calls or an emergency call every 57 minutes. Additionally, the LTFD responded to 206 mutual assist calls to surrounding municipalities and LFC responded to another 444 mutual assist calls. ■

TUESDAY	TUESDAY & WEDNESDAY PICK-UPS WILL BE WEDNESDAY & THURSDAY.
WEDNESDAY	TUESDAY PICK-UP REMAINS ON TUESDAY; WEDNESDAY PICK-UP IS ON THURSDAY.

For example: Memorial Day is Monday, May 28. This means the Tuesday pick-up will be delayed until Wednesday, and the Wednesday pick-up will be delayed until Thursday. July 4th falls on a Wednesday, which means Tuesday pick-up remains the same, but Wednesday will be collected on Thursday. ■

Planning & Zoning: Do I need a building or zoning permit?

If you're thinking about a spring or summer building project or renovations in your home, you may need a building permit or a zoning permit. The Lancaster Township Zoning Ordinance (Section 2103.1, February 8, 1999) states "It shall be unlawful to commence the excavation for or the erection, construction, alteration, extension, relocation, conversion or use and occupancy of any building, structure, sign, wall, parking lot, driveway or land, including an accessory building or sign or to commence the moving, demolition or alteration of any building, structure, sign, fence, wall, parking lot, driveway or land including an accessory building or sign, until the Zoning Officer has issued a Zoning Permit for such work; provided; however, no Zoning Permit shall be required for any such construction or alteration, the fair market value of which is less than five hundred (500) dollars and which would not change the use

classification provided that a Zoning Permit shall always be required for any excavation or construction work on, through or within the Township road or right-of-way".

No Zoning Permit is required for repairs to, and maintenance of, any building, structure, sign, or land provided that such repairs do not change the use, alter the exterior dimensions of the building or structure, or violate any provisions of the Zoning Ordinance. If you are not sure about requirements for the projects that you are planning this season, contact the Planning & Zoning Department at 291-1213. Marti Heim or Lynn Stauffer will be happy to answer your questions.

Building Permit application forms are available weekdays between the hours of 8:00AM and 4:00PM at the Township office. Fees are based on the cost of a project. Fees for new construction are based on the square footage of the building area. A Zoning Permit expires one year after the filing date. Extensions are permitted only with the Zoning Officer's approval.

Many residents do not realize it's illegal to place any objects in the

Township right-of-way. Fences, plantings, or any type of landscaping material is not permitted within this area. Questions about setbacks and use can also be answered by visiting our website: www.twp.lancaster.pa.us or calling 291-1213.

Public Works: Sweeping, Pruning, Paving

Street Sweeping Resumes April 10

Remember to move cars according to the posted signs. There will be a two-week grace period when only warnings will be issued for street sweeping parking violations. Beginning April 24, police will issue parking tickets to violators, just as they do during leaf pick-up in the fall. Streets with no sign restrictions are inspected regularly and swept on an as needed basis. Sometimes there may be a need to temporarily post paper signs.

Tree Pruning

This responsibility falls on the property owners. All trees on your property bordering a street or alley

must be kept trimmed to a minimum overhang of 10 feet off the surface of the roadway. Take a walk around the perimeter of your property and check for traffic obstructions. Shrubs also should be trimmed back to allow safe passage of vehicles and pedestrians. Intersections are an important area to inspect. Keep all growth low enough for a driver to see around the corner. The safety of all is the primary concern.

Township employees will do this if necessary in order to perform the roadwork. The owner, however, may not like the results of a hurried trimming. Please take the time to inspect your property and do your own trimming.


A number of alleys also will be paved. Residents will be given plenty of advance notice in writing before work begins on an alley in your neighborhood.



WATERSHED NEWS

The health of our water is the measure of how we are using the land.

Good news! Increasing activity in the watershed drained by the Little Conestoga Creek, which flows through the western portion of Lancaster Township, is in evidence. With the help of the Lancaster County Conservation District and an \$11,000 startup grant, the Little Conestoga Watershed Alliance has been formed. The Alliance, in partnership with Lancaster Area Sewer Authority, also received a Growing Greener grant of \$24,500 to be used for restoration work on a tributary of the creek in the area of LASA's facility along Charlestown Road, west of Millersville Road in Manor Township. Another tributary, Swarr Run in East Hempfield Township in the area of Flory's Mill, is the objective of a 319 grant awarded to the Lancaster County Conservation District. The initial effort along this run will include bank stabilization and fencing as well as in-stream habitat improvement.

By early spring, work on the riparian buffer along the Little Conestoga at Maple Grove will have been completed. A Chesapeake Bay Small Watershed Grant of \$31,000 had been received by Lancaster Township for this project. The grant was also used to promote awareness of the watershed among residents and provide educational opportunities for students of all ages.

Lancaster City will be developing a prototype greenway along the Conestoga River from the Conestoga Drive area to the South Duke Street bridge. Work on this project will occur during the spring and summer of this year. It will include a hiking and bicycling trail about 1.5 miles long.

There are numerous opportunities for you to participate in these endeavors to improve the quality of our watershed. Lancaster Healthy Commu-

nities is sponsoring a local chapter of the Senior Environmental Corps with the objective to establish a countywide water-monitoring program. A Water Quality Volunteer Corps, WQVC, is also being formed to train volunteers for the various watershed groups. Additional information about participation in either of these programs can be obtained by calling Katie Covello at 399-4575.

Additionally, PA DEP Citizens' Volunteer Monitoring Program, CVMP, encourages you to learn about your watershed by becoming a volunteer monitor. Activities might include collecting water quality data, evaluating fish habitat, counting birds or making visual observations of stream health. For
