Storm Water and the MS4

PROPER RUNOFF IS CRITICAL

Lancaster Township inspects, maintains, and services what is known as a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). The MS4 is a connected collection of water conveyances. These conveyances—curbs, gutters, ditches, naturally occurring and man-made channels, pipes, tunnels, catch basins, storm drains—carry storm water and storm water runoff, which discharges into rivers, streams, and creeks leading to the Susquehanna River, the Chesapeake Bay, and, ultimately, our oceans.

Storm water arriving as rain, snow, sleet, and hail falls upon the ground and is often absorbed. However, when the rate of precipitation is such that the ground cannot absorb it all, or the surface is impervious such as parking

lots, patios, sidewalks, and streets, the precipitation becomes storm water runoff and travels through the MS4 and into our waterways.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency has determined that polluted storm water runoff is a leading contributor to impaired water quality in over 40% of the United States waterways, which does not meet water quality standards.

Clogged inlets need immediate attention. Litter, leaves, and debris restrict the flow of storm water into an inlet. Litter that is forced in is discharged into waterways. There are literally hundreds of street and backyard inlets in the township. Please check those in your neighborhood.

Lancaster Township is engaged in a public education program regarding the potential for reducing the amount and concentration of polluted storm water runoff being discharged into waterways. As part of Lancaster Township's storm water management education program, residents are invited to participate in

Covered Devices Recycling Act

Effective January 24, 2013, the following items may no longer be placed at curbside or included with trash: desktop computers/laptops, monitors, keyboards and mouse, printers, speakers, TVs, and e-readers. These items must be taken to LCSWMA, 1299 Harrisburg Pike. ■

Trash & Recycling Bills

Semi-annual trash and recycling bills will be mailed April 1 and are due April 30. The fee is \$102 for six months. Seniors aged 60 or older are eligible for a 10% discount and that rate is \$91.80 for six months. Bring ID to the township office for the discounted rate. ■



Recycle More

Bigger recycling containers! 25-gallon recycling bins are on order! They may be purchased for \$10. We have a limited number of 22-gallon bins available for \$8. Increased costs for recycling containers have made it necessary to charge for these items; we are no longer able to provide them for free. If yours becomes damaged, duct tape will make it last longer. You may also use a container of your choice as long as it is marked recycling and is open faced. Be sure the word RECYCLING is visible to the hauler so it isn't mistaken for trash. ■

REMEMBER, RESIDENTS ARE LIMITED TO THREE 32-GALLON TRASH CANS OR BAGS (NO MORE THAN 30 POUNDS EACH) PER WEEK. ADDITIONAL BAGS OR CANS MUST HAVE A YELLOW TAG (\$1.25) ON EACH. BAGS/CANS WEIGHING MORE THAN 30 POUNDS, OR A LARGE ITEM (E.G. SOFA, MATTRESS, CARPET) MUST HAVE A \$4 RED TAG ATTACHED.



LARGE APPLIANCE & TIRE COLLECTION

is scheduled for the week of April 22 on your regular trash collection day. This includes washers, dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, stoves, freezers, hot water heaters, air conditioners, furnaces, dehumidifiers, etc. A tag must be purchased and attached to each appliance or tire (blue appliance tag: \$12, purple tire tag: \$1.25). Tires may be on or off their rims, but no commercial truck tires will be accepted. The township must be notified ahead of time of any item to be collected. If you already have a tag, please call 291-1213 to place the address and item(s) on the collection list.



TIME TO THINK ABOUT YARD WASTE

YARD WASTE collection, which includes leaves, garden residue, brush, shrubbery trimmings and small branches less than 2" in diameter, begins the week of April 8 and continues through the week of October 7. Yard waste bags will be available at the Public Works Facility, 1357 Meadowcreek Lane, starting Monday, April 1. Yard waste is collected every other week according to the schedule.

Please put your bag at the curb only when it is full. Fill bags to the line indicated and fold or smash in the bag. Twigs and branches sticking out from the bag may cause injury to the haulers when loading them into the truck. Loaders have the right to leave bags if not filled properly. Larger branches three inches or more in diameter must be cut into three-foot lengths and bundled. Place bundles next to your yard waste bags.

Grass is not permitted in yard waste bags. Grass makes the mulching process too wet. The most environmentally beneficial option for grass clippings is to leave them on the lawn. As clippings decompose they act as a natural fertilizer filtering down to the soil where it reduces water evaporation and encourages new growth.

ABOUT COMINGLED RECYCLABLES



Now that Lancaster Township has gone to comingled recyclables, we would like to remind residents that the following may be placed in recycling bins:

Paper: printed, copies, and colored paper; all envelopes and folders; index cards; mail, newsprint and flyers; magazines, pamphlets, glossy paper, posters, junk mail and newspapers; cardboard cereal or tissue boxes; paperback and telephone books (Please continue to take larger corrugated boxes to the Public Works Facility where there is a cardboard dumpster.)

Glass: food and beverage bottles and jars

Metals: aluminum, steel and tin cans, aerosol cans

Plastic: bottles and containers with necks and those with screwtop lids

Do not include needles/syringes; Tupperware or other plastic storage containers; styrofoam; light bulbs; window glass, mirrors, drinking glasses, or ceramics; aluminum foil; solvent, oil, or chemical containers; wet paper/cardboard; plastic food wrap.

Recycle plastic bags, wrappers, and dry-cleaner bags at your local grocery store.

Illegal dumping of any regulated material is a punishable offense. Lancaster Township will enforce all regulations and impose penalties on violators.

Planning & Zoning

Putting in a Pool?

For the safety of all residents, building and zoning permits are required prior to the construction and installation of any in-ground or above-ground pool, hot tub, or spa. There are very specific regulations for the fencing



and gates that must be installed as well. A swimming pool by definition is a structure intended for swimming that contains water over a depth of twenty four (24) inches.

Permit applications for a swimming pool must include a plot plan along with fence and gate information. Permit applications for hot tubs and spas must include a plot plan and information on lockable covers.

Equally important is conforming with the Lancaster Township zoning ordinance as it relates to setbacks, lot area coverage, and fencing.

Always check with the office before any work begins on any project. Staff can be reached for questions at 291-1213, Monday through Friday, 8:00AM to 4:00PM.

Fireworks Banned

Under Pennsylvania law, residents are permitted to use these hand-held devices: sparklers, novelties, and toy caps. All others are specifically prohibited unless a display permit is

obtained from the municipality.

Be safe and respectful of your neighbors. Do not use or set off illegal fireworks. Enjoy those displays that are regulated and permitted by municipalities.

Pet Owner Responsibilities

Don't forget to clean up after your pets and dispose of the waste appropriately. It is also the law that dogs must be on leash outside of their owners' property. Be considerate of your neighbors by not allowing continuous barking, especially into the night. Remember, all dogs must be licensed through the Lancaster County Treasurer's Office (299-8222).

A startling statistic: free-ranging (feral) domestic cats in the United States kill many more birds and mammals than previously thought, making them possibly the top controllable killer of U.S. wildlife. It is estimated they kill 1.4 to 3.7 billion birds and 6.9 to 20.7 billion mammals annually. These numbers suggest that cats could be endangering some species in certain regions.

Please consider turning your cats into house pets. This would reduce complaints about cats entering properties where they hunt birds and use gardens as litter boxes.

Grant for Spay/Neuter

The Humane League of Lancaster County (HLLC) is the recipient of a two-year grant from PetSmart Charities, which provides free spay/neuter services for domestic and feral cats. This is the direct result of outstanding results from the previous PetSmart Charities Grant for Spay/Neuter.



HLLC will host multiple free clinics for feral and owned cats in Lancaster Township and City. Residents may take

their domestic cat(s) or stray/feral cats to HLLC by making an appointment at spayneuter@humaneleague.com or calling 393-6551 extension 302. Owned cats must have a current rabies vaccination.

The vision of HLLC is a humane community where all pets are protected and wanted. The Humane League has been helping people and pets in the Lancaster area since 1917. Their goal is to make spay/neuter services accessible to pet owners and animal lovers who might not otherwise be able to spay/neuter their pets or ferals. ■

2013 Road Maintenance

Lancaster Township makes every effort to keep our roads and streets in good repair. They are inspected frequently and based on those inspections and average traffic flow, the roads to be repaved are chosen. Meadowcreek Lane, from Abbyville Road to the dead end, will be repaved this summer.

Street Sweeping

Street sweeping on sign posted streets resumes Tuesday, April 9. Warning tickets will be issued during the first two weeks. Tickets with fines will be issued beginning April 23. The township wants to clean and maintain the streets; a vehicle parked illegally prevents completion of the job. Non-signed streets will be inspected regularly and swept when necessary.

Street/Alley Tree Policy

The property owner is responsible for the care and pruning of all trees and shrubs along any street or township-maintained alley, whether in or out of the right-of-way. A minimum distance of 14 feet must be maintained between the road surface and the lowest overhanging branch. Smaller trees and shrubs should be pruned to allow signs

BE ALERT TO SCAMS

Each year as weather improves, residents are victimized by criminals who are experts in scamming homeowners. These criminal groups are sometimes known as Gypsies and Travelers. They routinely travel across areas in search of victims who are frequently elderly. The following are some of the more common scams:

Home repair: In this scam, the perpetrators represent themselves as self-employed home improvement contractors who have been working in the area. They will claim that they have done work in the neighborhood or have been sent by a relative or neighbor. They will then appear to do some work, but it will be extremely poor quality. They may spray roofs with a steam mist that they claim is a sealant; it isn't. Driveway sealant may be thinned black paint or drained oil. They will quote very reasonable prices at the beginning only to grossly inflate the price when they finish. They then often demand cash from the homeowner, pressuring and intimidating the victim to secure payment.

Diversion burglary/theft: In this scam, the criminals will distract the resident by pretending to need help locating a property line or utilities. The goal is to distract the resident long enough for an accomplice to enter the home and steal cash or jewelry. Again, the scammer may use pressure and intimidation if the victim does not cooperate.

What to do: Use only contractors that you know or for whom you have acquired references. Ask for their PA state contractor's number. Ask for the required solicitation permit issued by Lancaster Township. If you are suspicious or pressured by an unsolicited person, immediately contact the Manheim Township Police by calling 911 or 664-1180. Do not be taken in by a deal that sounds too good to be true; it's no deal. ■

to be clearly seen as well as visibility at intersections. The township reserves the right to do any necessary pruning if the property owner fails to maintain trees, bushes, or other plantings. If a tree or limb falls and blocks a street or alley, it is the property owner's responsibility to clean up the tree and remove any debris after reopening of the roadway.

Woody Waste Drop-Off

Yard/woody waste drop-off begins Monday April 1 (3PM to 7PM) and will continue through November 20 at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. The drop-off facility is closed all Fridays. The days and hours of operation are Monday–Thursday 3PM to 7PM until November 4 when the hours will be 2PM to 5PM. Please have ID ready for the gate attendant, who will inspect your load for contaminants and point out the proper place to unload. The

once-a-month Saturday drop-off begins April 6. The facility will be open the first Saturday of each month through November 2, 9AM to Noon.

Remember, lawn grass must be processed independently and may not be mixed with other woody material. A separate drop-off point has been established just for lawn grass.

This service is for township residents only. No contractors will be admitted because we are unable to accommodate the high volume of material they generate. Bio-bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit until October 3. ■





FIRE DRILLS AT HOME! HAVE AN ESCAPE PLAN

Fire can spread rapidly through your home, leaving you as little as two minutes to escape safely. Your ability to get out depends on advance warning from smoke alarms, and advance planning of a home fire escape plan that everyone in your family is familiar with and has practiced.

1. Floor plan.

Do it today. Start by drawing a floor plan of your home and marking two ways out of each room, especially the sleeping areas.

2. Meeting place.

Set up a meeting place (tree, mailbox, etc.) outside your home for everyone to report to after they have gotten out.

3. Fire drill.


Have a fire drill and practice your escape plan at least twice a year! Make it as realistic as possible.

Pretend the house is filling up with smoke and crawl low under the smoke, which contains deadly gases. Remember, heat rises. Cleaner air will be near the floor. Touch the doors with the back of your hand to check for heat before opening. Do not open a hot door! Go to another exit instead.

4. Everyone on board.

Last, but not least, be prepared. Make sure everyone in your family understands the escape route and knows what to do. Get out first, then call 911 at a neighbor's house.

Never go back into a burning structure once you have escaped! If people are trapped, firefighters have the best chance of rescuing them. The heat and smoke of a fire are overpowering. Firefighters have the training, experience, and protective equipment needed to enter burning buildings. ■
