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THE PARKS OF LANCASTER TOWNSHIP

Visit our four parks—you're in for a treat.

Have you taken advantage of the parks located in Lancaster Township? There are four beautiful sites offering a wide range of facilities that are open year round. Pack a picnic basket, gather up your family and friends, and take a tour of your parks.



LANCASTER COMMUNITY PARK

Lancaster Community Park (LCP) is the largest open recreational park in the Township with approximately 12 acres. LCP is located on Millersville Pike opposite Manor Shopping Center. This is a great site for family fun. Improvements include a gazebo, jungle gym, slide, benches and picnic tables, plenty of open space for games, wooded area, walking path, room for jogging, four baseball fields, two soccer fields, and a parking lot. When league games are being played, the snack bar is open to purchase food and drinks. Restrooms are located in the same building.

Windolph Landing Park is located at the south end of Wilderness Road along the Conestoga River. One of the

more picturesque and natural locations, Windolph Landing Park is equipped with a pavilion that includes picnic tables and benches and charcoal barbecue grills, a volleyball court, and a canoe launch. With five acres, there is plenty of space for running games and a parking lot. If you like to fish or just watch and listen to nature, go down along the river for some quiet solitude.

Maple Grove Park and Greenway surrounds the Maple Grove Community Building at 1420 Columbia Avenue. Maple Grove is also a lovely, natural setting along the Little Conestoga Creek. We're told people have good luck when fishing from these banks, and the unaffected beauty is a very pleasant place to spend some tranquil time. There is a pavilion with tables



and benches, a charcoal barbecue grill, and enough room on the three acres for several games at once. The Community Building sits in the middle of this charm. It is available to rent for parties, weddings, meetings, etc. Some of the amenities are a complete kitchen facility, rest rooms, an outside deck, and a P.A. system for music or speaking.

Hamilton Park Playground, on the 1200 block of Maple Avenue, is a privately run, community-supported park. For 63 years Township residents have operated and maintained it. There are slides, swings, baby swings, jungle gym, picnic tables, paved street hockey

area, softball and kickball field, and drinking fountain. A pavilion with tables and benches will shelter you from a sudden summer shower. If you're interested in holding an event, the pavilion can be rented with the inclusion of electricity, refrigeration, and restrooms. Call Deb Frailey, 392-2794, for information. The Hamilton Park Playground Association holds a number of family-oriented events throughout the entire year. See their schedule of events in the newsletter. ■

Trashy Tips



Newspapers must be placed in paper bags or tied in bundles; they will not be taken in plastic.



Grass, leaves, and sod may be placed **only** in biodegradable bags (\$1.25 each) or in trash bags with a green tag (5/\$6.25). Better yet, use a mulching blade and let the grass nourish your lawn.



Use 32-gallon containers or 30-gallon trash bags when putting out trash. The weight of each may not exceed 30 pounds. Trash haulers will not accept heavier loads.



Large items (up to two) may be put out for collection every week. Each item requires a red tag (\$4.00 each) and may not exceed a weight of 125 pounds. Items included are: furniture, box springs, mattresses, televisions, grills **without tanks**, patio furniture, microwaves.



The Township's mandatory recycling program includes batteries. Please place them in orange battery bags and lay them on the ground next to your recycling container. Free battery bags are available at the Township office. ■

**Public Works:
Summer Precautions**

Summer is upon us and summertime thunderstorms can be too. The Township tries to keep rainwater inlets open and clear of debris from unexpected showers. If you notice a storm water inlet that is clogged, give us a call. You might also give us a helping hand by clearing the debris and placing it on the back side of the inlet. We will pick up the debris as soon as possible.

The Trees Are Yours

Remember, street trees in front of your property are your responsibility. Don't forget to keep them well trimmed and remove any dead limbs. We don't want you facing a liability issue if a street tree causes damage to someone's property or vehicle.

The Township has seen an increase in complaints from residents who use public alleys. Trees and bushes along alleys do cause damage to vehicles. Property owners have the obligation of trimming and pruning along alleys bordering their property.

Clear View of Municipal Signs

Stop signs, yield signs, speed limit signs, and all regulatory signs must be clearly visible at all locations. Pennsylvania State Vehicle Code requires all signs to be maintained for full visibility. The Public Works crew will trim whatever is necessary to comply with law. The crew may not prune to your satisfaction. Property owners are welcome to perform this necessary task if they wish.

Grass-free Streets

Keep this tip in mind when mowing your lawn: make your first three passes along roadways with the discharge pointed away from the street. It not only prevents an unsightly street, but also helps to prevent clogged storm inlets. This is an easy fix.

Mulch Bonanza

The leaf mulch really went fast! Residents took advantage of this free commodity and used it on their gardens, etc. Another batch is curing in the Township composting facility. Because of the overwhelming demand, a much larger batch is being processed. It may be ready this fall, but most certainly by spring 2001. Call for availability before driving to the maintenance facility. ■

**Planning & Zoning:
The Who, What & Where of
Sign Regulations**

Many communities regulate the size, height, number, lighting, and placement of signs, both on- and off-site. Lancaster Township is no exception! More than a thousand local governments now prohibit off-site advertising and still more control on-site signs, according to Samuel N. Stokes, author of *Saving America's Countryside*. The current zoning ordinance was adopted by the Board of Supervisors on February 8, 1999. The purpose of Article XV is to "provide for signs as a means of effective visual communication; to assure compatibility of signs with land uses and buildings in the vicinity of the signs and in the community; improve the safety of pedestrians, vehicular traffic and property; enhance the aesthetic environment; minimize adverse effects of signs on nearby property; regulate the use of signs through a sign permitting process and to enable the fair and consistent enforcement of sign regulations."

What Is a Sign?

The Township's zoning ordinance defines a sign as "a device for visual communication that is used to bring the subject to the attention of the public. Signs do include lettering, logos, trademarks, or other symbols that are an

integral part of the architectural design of a building, that are applied to a building, or that are located elsewhere on the premises; signs affixed to windows or glass doors or otherwise internally mounted such that they are obviously intended to be seen and understood by vehicular or pedestrian traffic outside the building; flags and insignias of civic, charitable, religious, fraternal, patriotic, or similar organizations; insignia of governments or government agencies; banners, streamers, pennants, spinners, reflectors, ribbons, tinsel, and similar materials; and inflatable objects. Signs do not include architectural features which may be identified with a particular

business; signs within a building which obviously are intended to be seen primarily from within the building; flags of governments or government agencies; and displays of merchandise either behind store windows or outdoors.”

Type of Sign Matters

There are many different types of signs, both residential and commercial, which require the issuance of a permit from the Planning and Zoning Department. Some examples are: home occupations, billboards, business identification signs (both freestanding and building) and development signs. Of course, the regulations for size and location vary depending on the type of sign and the zoning district. Temporary signs are also regulated and a special permit is needed to erect one.

Please remember that erecting a sign on any property other than your own is prohibited. Temporary contractor signs must be removed after the job is completed. Special event signs may be displayed 21 days in advance of the event and must be removed within 5 days after the event. Signs that are not removed within the time limit may be removed and impounded by the Township. A recovery fee equal to the cost of removal and storage will be charged to the owner.

LANCASTER INTER-MUNICIPAL COMMITTEE COMPLETES GREENWAYS PLAN

The LIMC's "Conestoga Greenways: A River Corridor Conservation Plan" is now complete. You will find a summary in *Greenpoints*, inserted in this newsletter. Park and greenway activities include:

- installation of signs identifying the Conestoga River and its tributaries;
- publication of a directory, *Map & Guide to Public Parks in Central Lancaster County*, which is available for free at your Township office;
- investigation of ways to preserve Maple Grove Mill, including formation of an inter-municipal committee of historic preservation experts;
- LIMC play a lead role in proposing and encouraging the County Commissioners to create the Lancaster County Transportation Authority; and
- completion of a Traffic Congestion Management Study; it recommends projects that are relatively minor in scope and cost but will have a substantial impact on relieving congestion in the LIMC area.

The Lancaster Inter-Municipal Committee (LIMC) continues to encourage cooperation among 12 local governments in central Lancaster County. Anyone with comments or questions may write to LIMC, P.O. Box 8347, Lancaster, PA 17604-8347, or call 397-7313. ■

JUST WHAT IS A CRIME STOPPER?

As police coordinator for Lancaster City/County Crime Stoppers, one of my responsibilities is to bring this valuable, effective program to the attention of the good citizens of the county. Despite my efforts over the last three years, I am often surprised to discover how many of my fellow Lancastrians have never heard of Crime Stoppers or are only vaguely aware of its efforts to promote a safer, more crime-free community.

So just what is a Crime Stopper? Crime Stoppers International is a worldwide organization made up of more than 1,000 local programs. It seeks to aid law enforcement to solve crimes and make arrests by offering cash rewards to informants. These informants, who for a variety of reasons may be reluctant to be identified, can call Crime Stoppers on an anonymous tip line. The informant is not required to give his or her name and is assigned a caller number. Should information lead to an arrest, the informant, identified only by number, can claim a reward. The use of this anonymous tip line and the inducement of substantial cash rewards have resulted in countless arrests and convictions worldwide and

scores locally. These arrests often involve cases that would otherwise go unsolved.

Solving Mysteries

Have you seen the Crime Stoppers "Crime of the Week" notices posted in convenience stores, laundromats, and other public places? Police investigators throughout the county submit their unsolved crimes (and hard to catch wanted persons) to the Crime Stoppers Coordinator to be advertised as a "Crime of the Week." But even crimes that have not appeared in a notice are eligible for rewards. We would never turn away someone with good information.

Ten years ago, the Kiwanis Club of Lancaster stepped up to the plate as the sponsor of our local Crime Stoppers effort. The board of directors for Lancaster City/County Crime Stoppers consists primarily of volunteer Kiwanians. Turkey Hill Minit Markets has also been a long-time supporter and advocate of the program.

Cash rewards up to \$1,000 are offered. If you want to really support crime-

fighting efforts in your community, think about Crime Stoppers. Get involved, know and recognize your neighbors, be vigilant and report suspicious activity or people immediately, and form a Citizens Neighborhood Watch group.

Your support, both financial and by action, makes this worthy program stronger and more effective. This program works! Crime Stoppers removes criminals from the streets! ■
