

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## HOW ARE WE DOING?

**The Township is taking the public's pulse on how the Strategic Comprehensive Plan's goals are unfolding.**



**T**he Fall 1995 issue of the Township newsletter carried an article entitled "New Comprehensive Plan Will Guide Township's Future." Since adoption of the plan on December 9, 1996, the Township Supervisors, commissions, committees, and staff have been diligently implementing the plan.

A comprehensive plan in a municipality is comparable to a business plan in the private sector. It helps guide orderly growth and development by addressing future land use (planning, zoning, codes, subdivision), public health and safety, recreation and parks, finances (short- and long-term needs), street and highway construction, maintenance, etc. The Strategic Comprehensive Plan is also used to evaluate how well your elected and appointed officials serve the needs of the community.

One unique difference in the Lancaster Township Comprehensive Plan is that a portion of the plan is geared toward Township operations that speak directly to the issues identified by the residents who willingly participated in the formation of this plan. Each of the 12 Goals has strategies and action items appended to them.

### Goals

1. Improve the Township's organizational effectiveness.
2. Work with the School District of Lancaster to solve key resident issues.
3. Improve the Township's relationship with residents.
4. Encourage resident involvement in decisions that have community and neighborhood implications.
5. Establish partnerships with neighboring governments and other governmental entities.
6. Improve and develop the Township's park and recreational facilities.
7. Preserve and enhance the Township's historic character and resources.
8. Develop a transportation system which meets current and projected Township needs.
9. Manage the Township's land use and natural resources.
10. Develop a plan for adequate housing for residents.
11. Provide for utility services which meet the needs of Township residents and businesses.
12. Address the Township's stormwater management needs.

A complete review of progress and accomplishments was conducted after the end of 1998. A progress report was prepared and then summarized at the April 12 public Board meeting. A complete copy of the report is available at the Township office for your review.

The true test of success, however, is your perception of whether or not those persons serving Township residents have met your needs. Think about life in Lancaster Township in relation to the 12 listed goals and let us know how we're doing. Are the elected and appointed officials measuring up to your expectations? ## DOUBLE YOUR RECYCLING EFFORTS!

**T**he Lancaster Township Board of Supervisors adopted the goal of a 35% recycling rate — the same as the state of Pennsylvania. Our average for 1998 was 22.3%. Let's make 1999 a great year for the environment and double our recycling efforts!

The following are recyclable and should be placed in the green bins each week:

- All food and beverage cans, **rinsed**
- All glass food and beverage containers, **rinsed** (not drinking glasses or cooking dishes; put lids in regular trash)
- Plastic containers designated #1 (PET) or #2 (HDPE). Put lids in regular trash.

### Also recyclable but not in bins:

- Newspapers and magazines, placed in paper bags or tied in bundles.
- Batteries, placed in orange battery bag and then **placed on the ground**.

### Senior Citizen Discount

If you are 60 years or older and own the house you live in, you are entitled to the senior citizen discount of \$5.00 on your 6-month refuse and recycling bill. That saves you \$10.00 per year. Proof of eligibility includes: Office of Aging card, driver's license, birth certificate, or any other legal document showing your date of birth. Bring documentation to the office one time only to qualify for this discount.

### Grass, Leaves, & Sod Disposal

When you put out grass, leaves, and sod for collection, **you must attach a green extra service tag to each bag or can**. Green tags are sold in strips of five for \$6.25. Grass, leaves, and sod may also be placed in the new biodegradable bags sold at the Township office for \$1.25 each. These are the only two ways of disposing of these materials. Even if you put out no other trash that week, grass, leaves, and sod must always be tagged or put in biodegradable bags. The weight limit may not exceed 30 pounds for each bag. You run the risk of the bags not being picked up if you go over the weight limit. Grass, leaves, and sod are picked up on your regular trash day by a separate truck at a different time. Don't forget, most lawnmowers have mulching blades. Instead of bagging grass, just leave it on the lawn for self-fertilization. You can save the cost of bags and tags!

### Other Yard Waste

Branches, brush, twigs, shrubbery, flowers, vines, trimmings, vegetable waste, and limbs are to be included with regular trash up to the total maximum of three containers. Tree limbs must be cut in lengths no longer than four feet and tied in bundles. The weight limit is 30 pounds per container, bag, or bundle. If you have more than three containers, you must affix a yellow tag to each extra container. Yellow tags may be purchased in strips of five for \$6.25. These will be picked up by the regular trash truck.


If your trash is not prepared properly, the haulers will place a sticker on it stating what was done incorrectly. You will then have to remove the trash from the street and prepare it for the following week's pick-up. ■

**Public Works Department: Street Sweeping Has Begun!**

All streets with posted parking restrictions are cleaned on a weekly basis, weather permitting. This continues through early October when leaf collection begins. If rain interrupts the schedule, sweeping will occur the following week. Don't ignore the No Parking signs, however, just because it's raining; street sweeping and ticketing may still take place at the discretion of the Highway Department.

Non-posted streets run on a different schedule. Those with curbs are swept once a month and roads without curbs are swept every other month (May, July, September).

To keep your neighborhood looking great, remember to mow your lawn so the flow of grass is directed onto your lawn, not onto the street. Township Ordinance 1972-03 prohibits the dumping of grass on the street. Make your first couple of passes with the mower discharge directing the clippings toward your property. The highway crew and your neighbors will appreciate your thoughtfulness.

**Leaf Composting**

We would like to ask for your cooperation with off-hour drop-offs at the entrance to the Maintenance Facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. There are times when Township vehicles cannot get in or out of the gate because of a blocked driveway. You may make an appointment to drop off leaves by calling 293-1733, Monday-Friday, 7AM-4PM. Any yard waste other than leaves is not allowed. The DER Permit issued to Lancaster Township allows *only residential leaves to be composted at our facility*. A \$300 fine could be levied against a resident for illegal

dumping on Township property. The police have been notified to watch for offenders, so please call first. ■



**Planning & Zoning: Zoning Permits and Hearing Board**

*This article is the second in a series pertaining to the functions and procedures of the Planning & Zoning Department. The first article explained what zoning is and why we must have zoning regulations. This article describes the procedure for obtaining a zoning permit and the functions of the Zoning Hearing Board.*

**Zoning Permits**

If you are building a deck, putting an addition on your home, buying or building a storage shed, erecting a fence or sign, or extending/altering your driveway, you are required to obtain a zoning permit before any work commences. To be even more specific, a zoning permit is required for any excavation, construction/erection, alteration, demolition, extension, relocation, or conversion of use and occupancy of any building, structure, sign, fence, wall, parking lot, driveway or land. This applies to all structures on the property, including accessory buildings and signs. An application for a zoning permit is submitted to the zoning officer for review. The application must be accompanied by a general description of proposed work, a plot plan of the property showing dimensions of the lot, dimensions of all structures and impervious surfaces (i.e. driveways, walkways), distances from all structures and impervious surfaces to the lot lines, all easements, and the

appropriate fee. After review, a permit will be issued if the plan conforms to provisions of all pertinent laws. A permit is valid for one year after approval date. If an application is denied, the zoning officer will inform the applicant in writing stating the reasons for denial and informing the applicant of the right of appeal to the Zoning Hearing Board.

**The Lancaster Township Zoning Hearing Board**

... is a quasi-judicial board of three members and one alternate, all of whom reside in the Township. The Board of Supervisors appoints members to a three-year term for the purpose of conducting hearings and rendering decisions in accordance with the requirements of the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code. Some examples of why an application is made to the Zoning Hearing Board are requests for a variance, special exception, appeal of zoning officer's decision, and interpretation of the zoning ordinance. Prior to any hearing, a public notice is given, advertisement placed in the legal ads section of the local newspaper, and written notice of said hearing posted on the affected tract of land at least one week in advance of the hearing. The Zoning Hearing Board may attach reasonable conditions and safeguards to a decision if approval is given. All permits are to be secured within 12 months of the approval date. It is the duty and responsibility of the zoning officer to be certain all conditions are in compliance with the decision of the Board.

FYI ... Use our web site to locate your property on the GIS, to check your zoning district, and review the Township's zoning ordinance as it applies to you. ■

## GROWING GREENER FORUM SEEKS YOUR IDEAS

**I**s the word *sprawl* a pejorative to you? Does it evoke images of ugliness? Would you like to give public officials a piece of your mind on the subject?

If you answered *yes* to any of those questions, save a spot on your July 22 calendar. At the Eden Resort Inn at 5:30PM on July 22 you will have one of many chances to talk to public officials about land management practices.

In an aggressive grassroots outreach program, Pennsylvania state officials will be listening to what people throughout the Commonwealth have to say about best land management practices. Directed by an executive order signed by Governor Ridge, the Governor's Center for Local Government Services is conducting 50 forums across the state to hear your perspectives about rural, urban, and suburban land use. You will have the opportunity to offer creative solutions already implemented at the local level to promote sound land use. The Center for Local Government staff, as well as other state agencies, will be on hand to listen to how you want your community to grow in the 21st century.

In the executive order unveiling the

Growing Greener Initiative, Governor Ridge announced that this initiative will shift dollars from the state to communities, county conservation districts, watershed groups, and authorities. The purpose is to change the focus of environmental protection efforts to watersheds, invest in restoring public lands, and offer incentives to municipalities to do sound land use planning as recommended by the 21st Century Environment Commission.

Beginning with registration and refreshments at 5:30PM on July 22, you will be able to view various exhibits until 6:30PM. That will be followed by an explanation of the Growing Greener program, local or nearby examples of sound land use, and discussion of land use policies, livable communities, local government's role, and legal issues. A question-and-answer period will conclude the evening. Although the forums are free, the Center for Local Government is requesting reservations. Call toll-free (1-888-223-6837) for more information. **DID YOU  
GET A  
TICKET?**

**W**ith street cleaning comes the enforcement of parking restrictions by the police.

Several of the same questions come up every year and we'd like to answer them in advance with the hope of reducing the number of parking violations.

❖ **"What if my car is disabled and I can't move it in time for the sweeper?"** The vehicle owner must provide a copy of the receipt from a tow company and/or auto repair company to the Bureau of Police. If the reason for not moving is deemed valid, the parking violation will be dismissed.

❖ **"I moved my vehicle back before the enforcement aides arrived."** As a general rule, the enforcement personnel, as a courtesy, will not issue tickets unless the sweeper has to physically go around a car. Sometimes enforcement aides lag behind the sweepers when actually issuing tickets, and the sweepers will frequently wait for them to catch up. Technically, No Parking zones can be enforced for the entire time period stated on the sign, even if no street cleaning occurs. The signs read "NO PARKING" for a specific period of time and a specific day.

❖ **"I received a ticket and the car behind me didn't."** The car behind you may have moved to that position after the sweeper went by.

❖ **"It was raining so I didn't move my car and still got a ticket."** Don't assume the streets will not be swept. Sweepers and enforcement aides may be on duty regardless of the weather. This is a decision made by the Township.

Enforcement personnel are **NOT allowed to void or dismiss any violation once it is written.** They are doing the job for which they were hired. Please do not engage in any confrontations with them. Direct questions or complaints to the Lancaster City Bureau of Police, Patrol

Services Division at 291-4921. There are occasional exceptions when a street cleaning violation will be dismissed. The police make these decisions on a case-by-case basis. Not getting out of bed in time or just forgetting to move your vehicle are not acceptable excuses. Please understand that street cleaning is not meant to cause residents undue hardship. It is a service you pay for with tax dollars and results in a neighborhood in which you can take pride. ■
