LEMSA AND WEST END AMBULANCE ASSOCIATION JOIN FORCES

The Lancaster Emergency Medical Services Association (LEMSA) and the West End Ambulance Association (WEAA) plan to merge services for the purpose of consolidation of Emergency Medical Services (EMS).

Formed in April 1996 by St. Joseph Hospital and Community Hospital of Lancaster, LEMSA, a nonprofit company, is the largest emergency management service providing emergency and non-emergency medical and transport services in Lancaster County. Since its inception, LEMSA has worked with other EMS providers and includes a consolidation with the East Lampeter Ambulance Association in October 1997 and with Lancaster General Hospital ambulance services in April 1999.

LEMSA operates from eight stations throughout the county: St. Joseph Hospital, Lancaster General Hospital, Millersville, Willow Street, Gordonville, Quarryville, New Holland Avenue, and its administrative office on Lincoln Highway East.

Consolidation enhances services and clinical and operational efficiencies. The partnering also allows the streamlining of administrative tasks such as annual subscription drives and simplified billing. LEMSA will be launching its 2000 *all-inclusive* (basic and advanced levels of care) subscription drive in late

November to all Lancaster Township residents. The \$30 to \$50 annual subscriptions are based on the number and age of persons in the household. A subscription will eliminate any out-of-pocket expenses. Without a subscription, and depending on the level of service, an ambulance fee could cost over \$500.



LEMSA will honor all current WEAA subscribers in the western part of the Township until February 1, 2000. A special mailing will be

sent to former WEAA subscribers before the expiration. Residents in the east end of the Township are already benefiting from the East Lampeter Ambulance and LEMSA consolidation. East end residents will receive their mailing in late November. You may subscribe to LEMSA at any time or call 481-4841 with any questions.

In addition to emergency medical services, LEMSA provides nonemergency paratransit services including wheelchair van and invalid coach, medical standbys, and community training. ■

WHY SHOULD I RECYCLE?

Because recycling really does make a difference! In addition to community pride in keeping one's own neighborhood cleaner, it also:

- Reduces waste disposal costs.
- Promotes good will.
- Reduces volume at land fill sites.
- Reduces pesticides and chemicals in the environment.
- Assists renewal of threatened plants and animals.
- Reuses containers which helps lower product costs.
- It's the law and the right thing to do.

BUYING GAS YOU'RE NOT RECEIVING?

Want to save \$\$ at the gas pump *and* help the environment? Don't top off your gas tank! Many gas stations are equipped with an automatic gasoline shut-off system called a stage II vapor recovery control. If you top off, you're being charged for gas you don't receive. When the pump shuts off automatically, a vapor lock blocks more gas from entering your car. When the tank is full, the additional gas you pump is sucked back through an outer vapor-return hose into the station's underground storage tank. The meter is running, but you're not getting the gas. Topping also pollutes the air by clogging the vapor-return hose with liquid gasoline, prohibiting the hose from returning excess vapors. The chemicals in the vapors then enter the air we breathe. The vapor-return hose was designed to allow vapor to float back down the hose, not be blocked by a liquid-filled trap created by topping off.

EASY WAYS TO SAVE WATER

Help fight the drought and save \$\$ at the same time. The drought took a while to become serious. It will likewise take a while to ease up. Even with normal rainfall, it still takes time to replenish the lost water. Here are a few ways to help:

- Place a brick in your toilet tank.
- Collect water from dehumidifiers for watering plants.
- Install water-saving shower heads and faucets.
- Repair all faucet leaks (one drop per second wastes 2,400 gallons in a year).
- Operate your dishwasher and washing machine only when full.
- Turn off automatic icemakers and use ice trays.

**Planning & Zoning Department:
What & Why, Part 3**

This article is the third in a series pertaining to the functions and procedures of the Planning & Zoning Department. The first article explained what zoning is and why we must have zoning regulations. The second article described the procedure for obtaining a zoning permit and the functions of the Zoning Hearing Board. In this article we will present definitions of subdivision and land development.

**What is Subdivision and
What is Land Development?**

The definitions of *subdivision* and *land development* are set forth in the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code (MPC), Act No. 247 of 1968 as reenacted and amended by Act No. 170 of 1988. These definitions and meanings, in addition to other common and necessary terms, are used in subdivision and land development ordinances that are adopted by the individual municipalities.

A *subdivision* as defined in the Lancaster Township Subdivision and

Land Development Ordinance and by the MPC in Section 107 is: "the division or redivision of a lot, tract or parcel of land by any means into two or more lots, tracts, parcels or other divisions of land including changes in existing lot lines for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of lease, partition by the court for distribution to heirs or devisees, transfer of ownership or building or lot development, provided, however, that the subdivision by lease of land for agricultural purposes into parcels of more than ten acres, not involving any new street or easement of access or any residential dwelling, shall be exempted."

Land development, as defined in our Zoning Ordinance 1999 and in the MPC Subsections 107 (1), (2), and (3) is any of the following activities:

- "(1) The improvement of one lot or two or more contiguous lots, tracts or parcels of land for any purpose involving:
 - (i) a group of two or more residential or nonresidential buildings, whether proposed initially or cumulatively, or a single nonresidential building on a

- lot or lots regardless of the number of occupants or tenure; or
- (ii) the division or allocation of land or space, whether initially or cumulatively, between or among two or more existing or prospective occupants by means of, or for the purpose of streets, common areas, leaseholds, condominiums, building groups or other features.
- (2) A subdivision of land.
- (3) Development in accordance with section 503 (1.1) of the MPC, which allows for the exclusion of certain land developments from the definition of land development contained herein when such land development involves:
 - (i) the conversion of an existing single-family detached dwelling or single-family semi-detached dwelling into not more than three residential units, unless such units are intended to be a condominium;
 - (ii) the addition of an accessory building, including farm buildings, on a lot or lots subordinate to an existing principal building; or
 - (iii) the addition or conversion of buildings or rides within the confines of an enterprise which would be considered an amusement park. For purposes of this subclause, an amusement park is defined as a tract or area used principally as a location for permanent amusement structures or rides. This exclusion shall not apply to newly acquired acreage by an amusement park until plans for the expanded area have been approved by proper authorities."

P&Z Reminders

- Animal Ordinance No. 1992-02 states that: "... no owner shall permit any animal to defecate upon public property or the property of another unless such owner immediately removes the defecation and disposes of it in a sanitary manner (Section 4)." Please remember, this animal ordinance also pertains to cats.
- The Lancaster Township Noise Ordinance does not allow the playing of loud music or the continuous barking of dogs.

School District of Lancaster Update

The School District of Lancaster (SDL) has three new services this fall.

A new **Enrollment Center** has been opened for all new students in K-12. It is located on the fourth floor of the Carter and MacRae Elementary School, 251, S. Prince St., with hours Monday through Friday, 8:00AM to 4:00PM. Early childhood students should go to the third floor, 9:00AM to 2:00PM.

The **Lancaster Book Challenge** is designed to support and encourage pre-school through elementary children to become able readers. As part of this program the SDL now requires all K-12 students to read 25 books per year chosen from a list of recommended titles. The community is encouraged to participate in a variety of ways:

- Give recommended books to Lancaster Day Care, Community Action Program, Boys/Girls Clubs, city schools, and other childcare centers.
- Donate to the Lancaster Foundation for Educational Enrichment book fund.
- Establish a *Book Giving Tree* for children in need at your church or organization.
- Ask for a book donation at your next civic or social event.
- Volunteer to read with children in the schools, daycare centers, etc.
- Fund HOSTS, a nationally recognized reading mentor program
- Read at home.

Lancaster Township Fire Department and Lafayette Fire Company: Y2K Tips

As we prepare for the upcoming Y2K event, your local fire companies have a few tips regarding emergency preparedness and fire safety. You will find a number of tips and suggestions to assist you and your family included with this mailing. The fire departments feel very strongly that your planning for this event include some basic fire safety.

Many homes have installed emergency generators in the event of a power failure. There are two major items that should be checked with every generator installation. First, make certain that the exhaust manifold and piping are installed in accordance with proper fire code. Hot exhaust pipes have been known to cause fires if they are too close to, or touching, adjacent ordinary combustible material. Also, have an electrician install an isolation device to be certain the power you generate goes to the devices you have specified and does not bleed back into the electric company's lines. The second concern is to be certain the exhaust is properly sealed and leak tested to ensure no deadly carbon monoxide fumes can enter your home. Be sure there is a working carbon monoxide detector installed!

If you are planning to use a fireplace as a backup for cooking or heating, have a qualified chimney expert inspect the flue and all associated systems to be certain there are no cracks, openings, or other flaws that could allow a fire to spread into the structure. All fireplaces and chimneys should be inspected annually.

Lastly, it is vitally important that any flammable liquids be stored in an approved metal container. The approved containers should never be stored inside any structure. The explosive power of just one cubic quart of gasoline fumes equals one stick of dynamite. If you plan to store gasoline, propane, kerosene, or any type of flammable liquid on your property,



keep them outside in metal containers. Y2K will pass but we must be sure that residents remain safe and uninjured. Please contact either of your local fire departments for assistance in home fire safety. ■

Public Works Department: Leaves and Litter

Leaf collection begins Monday, October 11 and ends Friday, December 10, according to the following schedule:

Monday – All streets between Columbia and Marietta Avenue

Tuesday – Hamilton Park area follows Tuesday morning posted street cleaning schedule, plus Davis Drive, Spencer Avenue, S. President Avenue, 400 and 500 blocks of Atkins; East End follows Tuesday afternoon street cleaning schedule including City Mill Road, Conestoga Woods, Conestoga Boulevard.

Wednesday – Hamilton Park area follows Wednesday morning posted street cleaning schedule; School House Road; East End follows Wednesday afternoon posted street cleaning schedule.

Thursday – All streets on north side of Marietta Avenue to Newton Road

Friday – West side of Abbeyville Road; Bausman area; Hoover Road, Honeysuckle Lane, Bentley Lane area

Leaves must be placed on the street, next to the curb as close as possible before the scheduled pick-up date. The Township always tries to maintain the leaf collection schedule but weather or other conditions may cause a delay or even biweekly pick-up. Residents can always arrange to drop off leaves at the Maintenance Facility by calling 293-1733. If conditions require it, collection may begin earlier, but no schedule will be followed.

The Township's DER-permitted compost facility allows *only leaves to be composted*. The Township Supervisors urge all residents to keep grass clippings and other yard debris out of the leaf piles.

Remember that parking tickets will be issued during leaf collection. If it seems like an inconvenience to move your car, consider having to negotiate around hundreds of cars to collect leaves. The extraordinary resident cooperation in the past is very much

appreciated by the Public Works Department.

Winter On Its Way

Again this year, the Public Works Department staff asks your assistance in helping to keep the storm inlets clear of leaves and other debris. The road crew performs this task regularly, but with winter weather coming, a blockage could occur before the road crew arrives. Resident clearing of inlets will help prevent puddles and flooding. Please remove this debris and place it behind the curb where the crew will collect it.

Adopt-A-Highway

Lancaster Township has begun an Adopt-A-Highway program for service or volunteer groups as well as individuals or families. Under this program the group or individual agrees to become the special caretaker of a portion of the Lancaster Township roadway system. There are approximately ten miles of roadway eligible for this program. Volunteers are charged with picking up litter on certain roadways at least four times a year. Lancaster Township will place signs beside the roads acknowledging the adopting group. The Township also provides safety equipment and the other items needed by the group. The road crew then picks up filled trash bags.

Don't make vehicle theft easy by helping the common thief. A car that is unlocked, unattended, and full of items is the best way to attract trouble. Cold weather is not a deterrent. In fact, vehicle theft increases in the fall and around the holidays. Some simple preventative measures can be taken to help ensure you are not a crime victim.

- First and always, lock your car. An unlocked car is a quick and easy target.
- Never leave keys in your vehicle. Warming up the car while you go back inside is an open invitation to thieves. It is also a traffic violation with a \$25.00 fine.
- Park in well-lit areas at night or use your locked garage.
- Never leave valuables in your car. If you must, then place them in the trunk or hidden under the seats. Remove CD's and tapes and
