

TRASH & RECYCLING UPDATE

Lancaster Township adopted an ordinance in 1990 whereby all township landowners are required to have their trash collected by the township-authorized contractor. Exceptions are apartment buildings with four or more units and businesses (excluding in-home occupations). Under the ordinance, recycling is mandatory for all residents, including apartment dwellers and businesses within the township. Those that are exempt from the township trash service are required to have a licensed LCSWMA-approved hauler pick up their trash. Apartment owners are to provide trash removal and recycling opportunities for their tenants. It is the landlord's responsibility to inform their tenants of any township ordinances that may affect them.

Weekly trash collection

Trash is limited to three (3) bags or cans each week. Each bag or can may be no larger than 32 gallons and may weigh no more than 30 pounds. Extra trash tags may be purchased at the office (\$5/\$6.25) for each container/bag that is over the limit of three. Oversized items require a \$4.00 tag per item. When purchasing tags, you may be asked what your item is. Oversized items must be put out with trash the night before scheduled pick-up. Please do not put any recyclable materials or household hazardous waste in the trash bags or cans. ■



Refuse & Recycling

Where to take what?

The website earth911.com provides a comprehensive listing of what materials can be recycled and where. This includes materials that are not collected by the trash hauler.

Reminder:

No loose trash!
Place ashes from fireplaces, wood stoves, and coal stoves in disposable containers.


Disposing of non-recyclable glass

Last fall one of the Lebanon Farms Disposal loaders was severely cut by a piece of glass sticking out of a garbage bag. The proper way to dispose of broken glass is to wrap it in a brown bag, lay it in a box, and place it beside the garbage bag. If using a trash can, wrap the glass in newspaper and place it in your trash can.



What and how to recycle ...

- **PAPER:** Newspapers may be put in a paper bag and placed on top of the recycling bin. Do not use plastic bags. If it is raining, do not put out newspapers.
- **PHONE BOOKS:** Drop off at the township office during regular business hours.
- **GLASS:** All food and beverage jars/bottles; rinse the container, remove and discard the lid. Do not include other glass items such as cups, plates, windows, light bulbs, etc.
- **PLASTIC:** Plastic bottles/containers marked PETE or HDPE (#1 and #2 only) are recyclable. If the opening of the container is smaller than the bottom, it usually can be recycled. Rinse the containers; remove and discard the lids. Do not include bottles used for motor oils, paints or hazardous chemicals—they are considered contaminants. Other plastics go in the regular trash.
- **METAL:** Aluminum, tin, metal, and bi-metal food and beverage containers; includes soup cans, soft drink cans, etc. Rinse containers; remove and discard any screw-on caps and lids.
- **CARDBOARD:** A dumpster for recycling cardboard is located at our public works facility, 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. Please **DO NOT** put any trash or packing material in with the cardboard. Only corrugated cardboard is accepted—no cereal, cracker, pizza, or other food boxes should be placed in this recycling container. Remember, the dumpster is for residential use only. No businesses may use this container.
- **MAGAZINE DUMPSTER:** There is a dumpster for glossy magazines only, located at McDonalds Restaurant, 1434 Manheim Pike.
- **BATTERIES:** Recycle batteries at the township office during regular business hours. Or place them in an orange battery bag (available at the office) and put it beside your trash container.

WHERE DOES YARD WASTE GO?

Yard waste includes leaves, garden residue, brush, shrubbery trimmings, and small branches less than 2 inches in diameter. Branches must be bundled, in 3-foot lengths and placed next to your yard waste bags.

Please, no grass. Most people now realize that the most environmentally beneficial option for grass clippings is to leave them on the lawn. As clippings decompose they act as a natural fertilizer filtering down to the soil, where it reduces water evaporation and encourages new growth.

Each year the township purchases 46,000 biodegradable yard waste bags through a joint purchasing arrangement with the Lancaster County Solid Waste Management Authority. While supplies last, yard waste bags are provided free of charge to residents.

These bags will be available starting April 2 at the Public Works Department, 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. Residents are urged to take only the number of bags they need; there is a 10-bag limit each time. Yard waste collection continues every other week through October 4. Yard waste bags are to be placed out the same day your trash is collected. ■

Storm-Water Savvy



What YOU can do to keep keep our waterways clean:

- Never pour used oil or cleaning supplies into the storm-water system.
- Use pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers sparingly and properly.
- Report poorly managed construction sites.
- Install rain barrels or rain gardens that capture storm water and keep it on your land.
- Pick up pet waste and dispose of it properly.
- Store polluting materials indoors in leak-proof containers.
- Pick up a brochure (*When It Rains, It Drains*) in the township office for other tips on how understanding storm water can affect one's wallet, safety, health, and the environment.

Planning & Zoning

Pools, Decks, Patios, Sheds, Fences

Residential Pools: Building permits are required for permanent above- or in-ground pools. Setbacks are required from all property lines. Four-foot barriers/fences are required for both in-ground and above-ground pools.

PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) regulations require the discharge of water to be dechlorinated unless discharged to a public sewer.

Decks: A permit is required for a deck that is 30 inches or more above ground level. There are required setbacks from all property lines. Easements on the property may also affect plans.

Patios: A zoning permit may be required as well as setbacks from all property lines. A building permit is not required, but there is a maximum allowable lot coverage.

Sheds: A zoning permit is required for all sheds including prefab sheds. No building permit is required if the shed is less than 400 square feet. No sheds are



permitted in the front yard and setbacks are required from all property lines.

Fences: A fence may be no higher than four feet in a front yard and may be placed up to the property line. No fences are allowed in flood areas or storm water easements. Corner property owners should contact the zoning office for fence placement.

Always check with the office before work begins on any project. ■

township-maintained alley, whether in or out of the right-of-way. A minimum distance of 14 feet must be maintained between the road surface and the lowest overhanging branch. Smaller trees and shrubs should be pruned to allow signs to be clearly seen, especially at intersections. The township reserves the right to perform any necessary pruning if the property owner fails to maintain trees, bushes, or other plantings. If a tree or limb falls and blocks a street, the property owner must clean up the tree and remove any debris after reopening of the roadway.

Woody Waste Drop-Off

Yard/woody waste drop-off at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane (near the township office) begins Monday, April 2 and will continue through November 21. The drop-off facility is closed Fridays. Days and hours of operation are Monday–Thursday 3PM to 7PM. Please have ID ready for the gate attendant, who will inspect for contaminants and point out the proper place to unload. Once-a-month Saturday drop-off begins April 7. The facility will be open the first Saturday of each month, 9AM to Noon. Please remember, lawn grass must be processed separately and may not be mixed with other woody material. A drop-off point has been established just for lawn grass.

This service is for township residents only. No contractors will be admitted; we are unable to accommodate their high volume of material. Bio-Bags are available from the attendant (maximum of 10 bags per visit) until October 4. ■

Public Works Department

2012 Road Maintenance Projects

Lancaster Township makes every effort to keep our roads and streets in good repair. They are inspected frequently. Based on those inspections and average traffic flow, roads to be repaved are chosen. The following will be repaved this summer, contingent on budgetary constraints:

- Elm Avenue (Abbeyville Rd. to the cul-de-sac)
- N. Bausman Drive (entire length)

Street sweeping on sign-posted streets resumes Tuesday, April 10. Warning tickets will be issued during the first two weeks. Tickets with fines will be issued beginning April 24. The township wants to clean and maintain our streets. A vehicle parked illegally prevents completion of the job. Non-signed streets will be inspected regularly and swept when necessary.

Street/Alley Tree Policy

Property owners are responsible for the care and pruning of all trees and shrubs along any street or





A FEW BASIC SAFETY LESSONS

Many people don't know that clothes dryers are a leading cause of fires in the home. It is estimated that 15,500 fires from clothes dryers occur annually, accounting for an average of 10 deaths, 310 injuries, and more than \$84 million in property damage annually.

One of the most common causes of dryer fires is a lack of maintenance. Large quantities of lint in the traps demand cleaning after each dryer load. Without proper and routine cleaning, the dryer performs poorly, operates at elevated temperatures, and can overheat with dangerous consequences. And don't forget to clean the back of the dryer where lint can be trapped. A significant amount of lint can build up inside the dryer, even on the heating element! Pull out the lint trap and look underneath.

It is important that items with foam (such as throw rugs) or any plastic trim not be placed in the dryer. Always hang

these to air dry and check the operating manual for proper use and maintenance.

Another common cause of dryer fires is improper clothes dryer venting. A rigid or flexible metal venting or ducting material helps maintain proper airflow. Do not use plastic or vinyl exhaust hoses.

The ideal is to have short, straight, dryer duct venting. This helps reduce operating costs and extends the life of the dryer and clothing. The dryer duct should vent to the exterior, not into an attic or crawlspace. Vent systems must also be checked and cleaned. Disconnect, inspect, and clean the dryer duct on a regular basis. Check the outside vent while the dryer is operating to make sure the duct is not blocked and air is escaping properly.

Never run the dryer while out of the house or when asleep.

Matches and lighters safety

In the hands of an adult, matches and lighters can be useful tools, but in the hands of a child, they can be extremely harmful and dangerous. Children are curious by nature and attracted to fire, which is the leading cause of fire deaths for children.

Matches and lighters should always be stored out of sight and high enough so children cannot reach them, preferably in a locked cabinet. Teach children that if they find matches or lighters, they should

immediately tell an adult.

Choose child-resistant lighters and do not tamper with the safety devices on them. Remember, child-resistant lighters are not child-proof. Keep ashtrays and lit candles out of the reach of children.

Never underestimate a child's curiosity about fire, nor their ability to strike matches or start a lighter. Teach your children proper respect for and use of matches and fire to lessen the desire to play with them. Encourage a positive, respectful attitude toward fire safety.

Everyone must be aware of fire safety 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Do not wait until it is too late—practice fire safety every day!■
