# 'RENTER'S RESOURCE' NOW ON TOWNSHIP WEBSITE

**D**o you live in a rental property in Lancaster Township? Approximately one-third of the housing in Lancaster Township is rental units. They range from small to large apartment complexes to individual homes and everything in between. While the great majority of the rental units are clean, safe, and in good to excellent condition, an increasing number are in need of repair, and some even border on uninhabitable. *Everyone* is entitled to safe housing!

Each residence should have the absolute minimum of running hot water, adequate heating, utilities, and a working sanitary system. The law requires all rental units to have smoke detectors and, in most cases, carbon monoxide detectors, placed according to regulation.

In an effort to educate both renters and property owners on acceptable standards in the township, we have established a new section on our website

dedicated exclusively to that ideal. "Renter's Resource" lists information and resources that outline the rights and responsibilities for both parties and how to remedy most issues.

Lancaster County is fortunate to have the Lancaster Housing Opportunity Partnership (LHOP), which has improved the quantity and quality of affordable housing in a meaningful way. We are partnering with them and providing links to their website, [www.lhop.org](http://www.lhop.org), and the important information there.

All of this is aimed at providing better housing in a cooperative manner among property owners, renters, and the township. Residents may contact us privately with information outlining potential violations of the township's property maintenance code, building codes, or zoning ordinance. All correspondence can be kept confidential if requested.

## Doing Something About Stormwater Runoff

**S**tormwater is precipitation—rain, sleet, melting snow. Stormwater management prevents physical damage to persons and property from flooding, and prevents polluted runoff from negatively impacting local waterways. Individual property owners and homeowners are responsible for controlling stormwater runoff from their own homes and properties.

What can you do to help? Never dump *anything* into a storm drain, including oil, paint, soap, debris, and leaves. Use fertilizers and pesticides sparingly. Wash your car at a commercial car wash where the wastewater is treated and recycled. Always properly dispose of pet waste.

### Illicit Discharge Reporting

As part of the management of our stormwater system and to provide residents with a mechanism to report any observed discharges that might be illicit, dangerous, or undesirable, we now have a Citizen Reporting Illicit Discharge Form on our website. Please alert us to any suspected source of non-stormwater observed being discharged into the ground, our physical piped system, or directly to any stream, river, or pond. Your observations are vital to successfully managing our storm water systems. ■

► **Trash & Recycling Bills**

Semiannual trash/recycling bills will be mailed April 1 and are due April 30. The fee is \$102.00 for six months. Seniors aged 60 or older are eligible for a 10% discount, or \$91.80 for six months. Bring your ID to the township office for the discounted rate.

Lancaster Township adopted an ordinance in 1990 whereby all landowners within the township are required to have their trash picked up by the contractor hired by the township. Exceptions are apartment buildings with four or more units and businesses (does not include in-home occupations). Those that are exempt from being on the township trash service are *still required to have a licensed LCSWMA approved hauler to pick up their trash*. Under this ordinance, recycling is mandatory for all residents, including apartment dwellers and businesses within the township. Apartment owners are to provide trash removal/recycling opportunities for their tenants. It is the landlord's responsibility to inform their tenants of any ordinances the township has that may affect them.

**ABOUT THAT YARD WASTE**

**Y**ou know you're in the warmer seasons when yard waste collection begins. This year, yard waste collection in Lancaster Township begins the week of April 4 and continues through the week of October 3.

Collection includes leaves, garden residue, brush, shrubbery trimmings, and small branches less than 2" in diameter.

Yard waste bags will be available at the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane, starting Monday, April 4. Yard waste is collected every other week, according to the Penn Waste collection calendar.

Put your bag at the curb only when it is full. Fill bags to the line indicated and fold or smash in the bag. Twigs and branches sticking out may cause injury to the loaders. Loaders have the right to leave bags if not filled properly. Larger branches three inches or more in diameter must be cut into 3-foot lengths and bundled. Place bundles next to your yard waste bags. **Grass is not permitted in yard waste bags.**

Remember, the most environmentally beneficial option for grass clippings is to leave them on the lawn to decompose and act as a natural fertilizer.



**STORM DEBRIS CLEANUP**

**D**O NOT put fallen tree branches, sticks, etc. into a trash can with or without trash, or piled up (unbundled, untied) on the curb—*It will not be collected.*

**COVERED DEVICES RECYCLING ACT**

**A**s of January 24, 2013, the following items *may not* be placed at curbside or included with your trash: desktop computers/laptops, monitors, keyboards and mouse, printers, speakers, TVs, and e-readers. They must be taken to LCSWMA, 1299 Harrisburg Pike.

► **Large Appliance and Tire Collection**

TAKES PLACE THE WEEK OF APRIL 11 TO 14 ON YOUR REGULAR TRASH DAY. LARGE APPLIANCES INCLUDE WASHERS, DRYERS, DISHWASHERS, REFRIGERATORS, STOVES, FREEZERS, HOT WATER HEATERS, AIR

CONDITIONERS, ETC. A \$12 BLUE TAG MUST BE PURCHASED AND ATTACHED TO EACH APPLIANCE. ITEMS TOO HEAVY TO BE LIFTED INTO A TRUCK BY TWO PEOPLE WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. EACH TIRE REQUIRES A \$2 PURPLE TAG, AND TIRES MUST BE REMOVED FROM THEIR RIMS. NO COMMERCIAL TRUCK TIRES WILL BE ACCEPTED.

PURCHASE TAGS AT THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE. IF YOU ALREADY HAVE A TAG, PLEASE CALL 291-1213 TO PLACE YOUR ADDRESS AND ITEM(S) ON THE COLLECTION LIST.



## Public Works Department

### 2016 Road Maintenance

Lancaster Township makes every effort to keep its roads and streets in good repair. They are inspected frequently and, based on those inspections and average traffic flow, the roads to be repaved are chosen.

The following is a preliminary list of roads to be repaved summer 2016:

- S. Conestoga Dr. from S. Broad St. to East King St.
- Nassau Rd. from East Orange St. to Ranck Mill Rd.
- Alley X from Hamilton Park Dr. to Maple Ave.
- Alley W from Hamilton Park Dr. to Spring Grove Ave.
- Woods Ave. from Race Ave. to N. President Ave. (entire street)
- City Mill Rd. from Betz Rd. to S. Conestoga Dr.

*Some of the streets may be put on hold due to budgetary constraints.*

### Street Sweeping

Street sweeping resumes on April 5. Sweeping on “signed streets” takes place the first and third Tuesdays and Wednesdays of each month. **NO WARNING NOTICES WILL BE ISSUED!** *The police will enforce street signs that prohibit parking on certain days. When street sweeping ends, parking restrictions remain in force on signed streets due to leaf pickup beginning October 10.*

Residents who keep the street in front of their property debris-free help make the biweekly sweeping easy. The biweekly sweeping schedule allows us to clean our other nonsigned neighborhoods more frequently. Please read the signs and move your vehicle. A vehicle parked illegally prevents the township from cleaning and maintaining the streets. ### Street/Alley Tree Policy

The property owner is responsible for the care and pruning of all trees and shrubs along any street or township-maintained alley, whether in or out of the right-of-way. Township alleys with overgrown trees, bushes, and hedges are very difficult to plow. It can cause plowing equipment to break branches and damage right-of-way plantings, it is hard on equipment, and can be dangerous for the operator.

The township will take an aggressive approach to removing and trimming trees and bushes in township-maintained alleys. Most alleys have a 14-foot right-of-way width that must be clear of fences, vegetation, or objects. Check your property! If you have right-of-way encroachment, please remove it.

A **minimum distance of 14 feet** must be maintained between the road surface and the lowest overhanging branch above our streets. Smaller trees and shrubs should be pruned to allow signs to be clearly seen, as well as visible at intersections. The township reserves the right to do any necessary pruning if the property owner fails to maintain trees, bushes, or other plantings.

When a tree or tree limb blocks a township roadway and or alley, the Public Works Department will attempt to open the roadway for the safe passage of vehicles. If a fallen tree or branch is too large for the department to handle, the roadway will be closed and the property owner will have 24 hours to contact a tree removal contractor and have the tree removed. It is the responsibility of the property owner to secure a private contractor to clean up the tree and remove any debris in order to reopen the roadway.

When a property owner does not arrange for timely removal or cannot be reached, the township will have the obstruction removed by a contractor and the property owner billed for those services.

### Yard/Woody Waste Dropoff

Yard/woody waste dropoff begins

Monday, April 4, at the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. Days and hours of operation are Monday—Thursday, 3pm to 7pm, until November 7 when hours change to 2pm to 5pm. Closed all Fridays. The once-a-month Saturday dropoff begins May 7 and continues the first Saturday of each month through November 5, 9am to noon. Closing date is Wednesday, November 23.

**Service is for township residents only, and no contractors will be admitted.** Please have ID ready for the gate attendant, who will also inspect your load for contaminants and point out the proper place to unload. Bio-bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit.

### Mulch and Compost

After April 4, mulch/compost will be available for *hand-loading* from the area behind the main gate—Monday-Thursday, 3pm to 7pm. Mulch/compost will be loaded Monday-Thursday, 3pm to 4pm, and on Saturday, May 7, and Saturday, June 4 from 9am to noon. *Closed Fridays.* After June 4, call 293-1733 to check on availability, and for loading times. All mulch/compost is free to Lancaster Township residents while supply lasts. *No contractors will be serviced.* ■

## Planning & Zoning Department

### Determining your property lines

If you need to know exactly where your property lines are, your deed, in most cases, will give you the legal description. Sometimes the surveyor pins can also be found. If not, you will need to contact a surveyor.

Although the township is unable to recommend a surveyor to you, the township’s Planning & Zoning Department can provide you with a printout that shows the dimensions of your front, back, and side property lines. That information can also be found on your deed. If you do not have a copy of or cannot find your deed, contact the Lancaster County Recorder of Deeds office at 299-8238. ■

### Crime Prevention Reminders: Simple Ways to Stay Safe



**T**here are simple ways you can prevent crimes against your property.

It is very important to remove valuables from your vehicles and always lock the doors, even if they are parked right in front of your house or in your driveway.

It is also important to close and lock your garage doors and windows—the most accessible entry points for unwanted visitors.

#### Suspicious? Report it NOW

Most criminals who are looking to steal from cars or residences are looking for easy targets. If you see someone or something suspicious, please call the police right away. In an emergency, dial 911. For non-emergency assistance call 664-1180. Do not wait until morning or the next day; we need to know about things as they occur so that an officer can be sent to investigate. By working together, we can make the community a safer place.

The Manheim Township Police Department has a crime tip line for residents to call and report suspected drug dealers, criminals, and ongoing criminal activity. The number is 569-2816. The line is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and is completely anonymous. ■

### LITTERING AND ILLEGAL DUMPING ARE AGAINST THE LAW

**B**y definition, litter is mainly small items that have been scattered—for example, paper, food wrappers, beverage containers. Littering can be intentional or accidental. Some trash found along the road is the result of an unintentional act, such as items blown from yards and vehicles or debris left over from accidents. On the other hand, illegal dumping is always intentional and typically involves appliances, tires, bags of household trash, furniture, and construction and demolition debris. Despite their differences, litter and illegally dumped items are costly and time-consuming to clean up, and pose significant threats to the environment and to the community.

If you see someone littering or dumping items where they shouldn't, please report the incident to the proper

authorities. Improper disposal of trash—littering or illegal dumping—is against the law, and violators can be prosecuted.

If you observe someone littering or dumping, **DO NOT APPROACH** them. Instead, get details and descriptions of the incident and turn them over to an enforcement agency as soon as possible. Helpful information includes the license plate number and vehicle description, descriptions of the people involved, and date and time of the incident. If you witness trash being thrown from a vehicle, the vehicle license number may be all that you need to report after

witnessing a littering incident. However, the more information you provide, the stronger the case will be.

When someone litters or dumps trash illegally, it devalues our community and threatens the environment. You can help stop this costly problem by reporting such incidents to the township and other authorities. ■
