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Calls claiming to be PPL or IRS may be bogus

HOW TO DETECT A

The Manheim Township Police Department has fielded numerous complaints from citizens regarding suspicious phone calls from both PPL Electric and the Internal Revenue Service. In both instances, citizens receive unsolicited calls from individuals claiming to be from either PPL or the IRS and mimic the call centers from both agencies. Customers are told their accounts are delinquent or they owe back taxes. They are also threatened with having their electricity shut off or arrested for tax evasion. Customers are told to provide account numbers and social security numbers, and even provide payment over the phone using credit cards, debit cards, or prepaid money cards. There have even been instances where customers were asked to purchase Apple iTunes gift cards. Many of these calls sound legitimate because the callers use official titles and names, and even spoof telephone numbers on Caller ID to make it appear as though they are legitimately calling from PPL or the IRS.

If you are receiving such calls, be suspicious and safeguard yourself from providing information to the caller. To avoid being the victim of a scam, remember the following:

The Real PPL ...

- Never sends out anyone to demand bill payment.
- Does not call customers seeking personal information.
- Never calls customers threatening to shut off electric service unless immediate payment is made.
- Does not accept Green Dot or other prepaid debit cards for bill payments.
- Does conduct collections activities on accounts that are legitimately delinquent. When PPL begins the service termination process, it provides a formal notification that involves a letter and phone call as well as information left at the address in question.

The Real IRS ...

- Never asks for credit card, debit card, or prepaid card information over the telephone.
- Never insists that taxpayers use a specific payment method to pay tax obligations.
- Never requests immediate payment over the telephone and will not take enforcement action immediately following a phone conversation.
- Does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email to request personal or financial information.

This includes any type of electronic communication, such as text messages and social media channels.

- Does not ask for PINs, passwords or similar confidential access information for credit card, bank or other financial accounts via email. Recipients should not open any attachments or click on any links contained in the message.

If you receive a call of this nature, hang up immediately and provide no information to the caller. Call the Manheim Township Police Department at (717) 664-1180, and file a report. Officers can assist citizens in verifying if the call was legitimate or not. ■

Stormwater Management and Clean Water

Clean water is among people's biggest concerns, yet few recognize that the largest cause of water-quality problems comes from polluting activities on the land. You can make a difference: Direct the flow of downspouts to grassed areas. Convert small low-lying areas into rain gardens, consisting of water-tolerant plants and bushes that will help retain and infiltrate runoff. Reduce pollutants that can be carried in runoff into streams and water supply intakes. Do not apply fertilizers or pesticides to your lawn or garden just before a rainstorm or near a water body. We all care about clean water, and we all need to play a role in keeping it that way. ■

► **Semiannual trash & recycling bills**

WILL BE MAILED OCTOBER 1, 2016, AND ARE DUE OCTOBER 30, 2016. RESIDENTS 60 YEARS OR OLDER CAN OBTAIN A 10% SENIOR DISCOUNT BY BRINGING ID WITH PROOF OF AGE TO THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE.

► **Christmas Tree Collection**

takes place January 9–12, 2017 on your scheduled trash day. This is the only free pickup and applies to real trees only. All decorations must be removed; tree should not be in a bag. If you miss the collection, it will require a \$4 oversized item tag for trash disposal. Artificial trees also require a tag. Purchase tags at the township office. Trees should not be put in the trash before January 9. Real trees also may be dropped off at a designated area at the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane, January 3–6 and January 9–13, 7:30am–3:30pm. No tree bags, or any other woody waste will be accepted—“Real Trees Only.”

YARD WASTE COLLECTION

... by Penn Waste ends the week of October 3. Yard waste bio-bags will be available at the maintenance facility until Thursday, October 6 (or while supply lasts). Once collection stops, residents must take their bio-bags to the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. After November 23, yard waste should be included with regular trash in plastic bags, and set out as part of your 96 gallons per week collection.

THE 2ND COMMUNITY SHRED EVENT

COVERED DEVICES RECYCLING ACT

... PA Act 108 of 2010 prohibits electronic items from being placed out for trash or recycling: Desktop computers/laptops, monitors, keyboards and mouse, printers, speakers, TVs, and e-readers, etc. These items must be taken to LCSWMA HHW facility, 1299 Harrisburg Pike. Visit www.lcswma.org for additional information.

NINE-VOLT BATTERIES CAN BE DANGEROUS.



Do not store them in a drawer near paper clips, coins, pens, or other batteries. Cover the posts with masking, duct, or electrical tape before placing in a battery recycle bag.

USED SHARPS AND NEEDLES ARE HAZARDOUS!

They can injure and spread infections causing serious health conditions. Call 397-9968 for a free Safe Clip™, or place them in a heavy plastic container so the needles will not stick the crew during collection. Put the sealed container in your trash bag, never in recycling. DO NOT put trash collectors and the public at risk by disposing of these items improperly.

► **Large Appliance & Tire Collection**

is scheduled for the week of November 7 through 10 on your regular collection day. Large appliances include washers, dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, dehumidifiers, etc. A \$12 blue tag must be purchased and attached to each appliance. Items too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted. Each tire requires a \$2 purple tag, and must be removed from the rim. Commercial truck tires are not accepted. Purchase tags at the township office. To place your address and item(s) on the collection list, email jjyost@twp.lancaster.pa.us or call 291-1213 x301 at least two business days in advance of collection.

FLOWERPOTS, BIRDFEEDERS, OLD TIRES, WHEELBARROWS, AND BUCKETS ARE A FEW EXAMPLES. WHEN WINTER ENDS AND SPRING RETURNS, CHECK AGAIN, AND OFTEN. TAKE THE BITE OUT OF THEM, BEFORE THEY BITE YOU.

Heating with oil?

If you use a home-heating oil tank for your heat source, the Department of Environmental Protection encourages you to inspect it before getting it filled for winter. Poorly maintained or leaking oil tanks can pose a fire risk, diminish indoor air quality, or contaminate groundwater. Preventing leaks will save energy and money, and protect your health. Cleaning up a spill can cost up to \$50,000 and may not be covered by homeowner's insurance. Check with your insurance provider to see whether coverage is available.

The DEP offers these tips: Always assume the tank contains at least some oil, routinely inspect the tank and all attached equipment, check for signs of rusting, including the structural supports, examine the tank's fill line and feed line for leaks, and never tip over or empty a tank onto the ground. Recognize that wet spots or odors near the tank may signal a problem. Always hire a professional to perform maintenance or repairs to a heating oil tank system.

Autumn leaves

Leaves are collected on a rotating basis. The crew starts at one end of the township and continues day after day until the entire township has had a collection; then it starts all over again. If you reside on a street with signed parking restrictions (first and third Tuesdays and Wednesdays of the month), please abide by the schedule as it appears on that sign to avoid a parking ticket. The no-parking regulation

Important Notice

Leaf pickup for *non-signed* streets begins October 10; ends December 16. For *signed streets*, it begins October 18; ends December 7. *Schedule may be altered at any time due to weather conditions. When street sweeping ends, parking restrictions remain in force on signed streets due to leaf pickup beginning. There will be no warning notices; parking tickets will be issued. allows a more complete leaf pickup and provides safety for the crew members.


Residents are reminded that grass clippings are not to be placed on the street for pickup as it clogs the machinery; it will be left on the street for proper disposal. The township will continue to pick up bagged leaves on some high-traffic state highways that are not included in the regular schedule. Plastic or paper bio-bags can be used.

drop-off service is for residents only. **NO CONTRACTORS WILL BE ADMITTED.** Yard waste bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit, until October 6 (or while supply lasts); 20 bag limit per week, per property owner. Bio-bags can also be purchased at Lowes or Home Depot.

Snowstorms

During a snowstorm, while the snow is still falling, the road crew makes an "emergency pass," plowing in two directions up and down the street to allow for the passage of emergency vehicles. After the snow stops, the crew will return to widen the streets for on-street parking and allow room for future storms. Please remove vehicles from the street, if possible, to allow plows to get close to the edge of the road in order to make the road as wide as possible.

It is recommended that reflective markers be placed along your yard in noncurbed areas. It is impossible for the plow driver to determine where

Yard Waste

Yard/woody waste drop-off will continue through November 23. Days and hours of operation are Monday-Thursday, 3pm to 7pm. On November 7 hours change to 2pm to 5pm. Please have ID ready for the gate attendant who will inspect your load for contaminants and direct you to the proper place to unload. This

the road edge is and your lawn edge begins. Sometimes mailboxes are toppled or damaged by the snowplow if they are too close to the road edge or mounted poorly. Even properly installed mailboxes can be damaged by heavy wet snow that comes off the plow more forcefully. Our operators make every effort to avoid or minimize damage to property; however, the repair of mailboxes, lawn areas, trees, and/or shrubbery planted on the right-of-way is the property owner's responsibility.

Extra steps after a snowstorm

- Snow should be plowed or shoveled to the side of the driveway away from the flow of traffic.
- Clearing snow for a distance before the driveway allows the plow to unload before reaching the driveway entrance.
- Eliminate snow piles at driveway entrances; they may obstruct a motorist’s vision on the main road, as well as those exiting the driveway.
- Please assist the fire and highway departments by clearing snow away from fire hydrants and opening up storm inlets to allow the melting snow a place to go and avoid possible flooding of the roadway.
- Do not throw snow onto roads after they have been plowed. This creates hazardous driving conditions and is against the law by violating Ordinance No. 3 of 1987. ■
