Adopt-An-Inlet Program Maintains Stormwater Facilities

Storm pipes or basins need to be checked and maintained on an ongoing basis. Sometimes that only involves removing leaves or debris that could clog the flow of water. In other cases it involves removing larger obstructions that have built up over time. Erosion can also occur when a swale becomes overwhelmed, which can lead to problems in the swale and on land downstream of the erosion.

Join the township in helping to maintain our storm sewer by participating in the Adopt-An-Inlet program. Go to www.twp.lancaster.pa.us where you can learn more and even report an inlet in need of maintenance. If you're attempting to clear an obstruction, never do it in deep, flowing water, which might put you in danger.

The best time to check for obstructions is before a storm. It's also a good idea to know who is responsible for maintenance of a pipe or basin. It might be on private property, or a homeowners association might be involved.

Address erosion issues during dry weather, and plan carefully. If you see a problem in a township road or park, contact the township office. ■

New Trails in the Works

PATHS TO PRESERVATION—AND BETTER HEALTH

In their continued commitment to walkability, the township supervisors are happy to announce new walking trails and plans for additional efforts for safe, walkable routes throughout the township. Trails not only preserve open space but also offer opportunities for physical activity to improve fitness and health.

New trails

The Maple Grove trail connects School House Road, Hamilton Park (at Meadowcreek Lane), and the Maple Grove Park. Two new trail heads have been constructed with parking provided at Maple Grove. The path is crushed and rolled stone, and accommodates walking, biking, and strollers. The path provides excellent views and access to the Little Conestoga Creek. This trail connects to a linear park on the Manor Township side of the creek, with future connections planned to the Boas Park in East Hempfield. Total distance from Maple Grove to School House and back on the Manor side is one mile.

The half-mile Southern Village trail runs along a tributary to the Conestoga River, and was installed as part of the land development plan to Southern Village. The trail is paved and runs from within

the neighborhood at Waypoint Drive and continues down along the creek to a connection along Wabank Road. From there, trail users can connect to the new trail at Martin Elementary School. No parking is provided along Waypoint, but users from out of the area should find sufficient parking at Martin Elementary. The rustic trail at Martin Elementary

is a combination of asphalt and dirt, running around the perimeter of the school, as well as down along the creek to an observation deck constructed by the Rotary Club. Users can cross at the

signalized intersection and connect to the walking path that surrounds Comet Field. Distance around the school is a half-mile, and around Comet field three-quarters of a mile.

Future trails and connections

Riverside Avenue—A trail along the Conestoga River is being proposed as part of the plans for the City Operations Center. This loop trail will run from Riverside Avenue at Ranck Mill, along the old access road, down along the Conestoga to a trail head at the base of the hill at North Conestoga Drive. Distance will be three-quarters of a mile with connections to sidewalks leading to Burrowes Elementary.

Conestoga Boulevard—This segment of asphalt trail will help connect the Conestoga Gardens neighborhood to the existing 1.3-mile Conestoga Greenway Trail.

Conestoga Reserve—As part of the overall land development plan, a walking trail will be installed from Betz Road to Conestoga Drive that will eventually connect to the Conestoga Greenway.

Community Park Campus—With the construction of the new Hamilton Elementary School, the township is looking to expand pedestrian facilities in Community Park, as well as increase connections to the park and school campus with access to South West End Avenue, and signalized crossing to the shopping center. ■



► **Trash & Recycling Bills: April**

Semi-annual trash/recycling bills will be mailed April 1 and are due April 30. The fee is \$102 for six months. Seniors aged 60 or older are eligible for a 10% discount; \$91.80 for six months. Bring your ID to the township office for the discounted rate.

Lancaster Township adopted an ordinance in 1990 whereas all landowners within the township are required to have their trash picked up by the contractor hired by the township. Exceptions are apartment buildings with four or more units and businesses (does not include in-home occupations).

Those exempt from being on the township trash service are still required to have a licensed LCSWMA-approved hauler to pick up their trash. Under this ordinance, recycling is mandatory for all residents, including apartment dwellers and businesses within the township. Apartment owners are to provide trash removal/recycling opportunities for their tenants. It is the landlord's responsibility to inform their tenants of any township ordinances that may affect them. ■



COVERED DEVICES RECYCLING ACT

PA Act 108 of 2010 instituted a recycling law for covered devices/e-waste. Since January 24, 2013, residents are prohibited from disposing of televisions, computers and accessories, cell phones, cameras, etc. with curbside trash or recycling. These items must be taken to the Lancaster County Hazardous Waste Facility at 1299 Harrisburg Pike. For more information call (717) 397-9968 or visit www.lcswma.org. YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Yard waste collection begins the week of April 3 and continues through the week of October 9. Collection includes leaves, garden residue, brush, shrubbery

trimmings, and small branches less than 2" in diameter. Yard waste bags will be available at the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane, starting Saturday, April



1. Yard waste is collected every other week according to the Penn Waste collection calendar. Put your bag at the curb only when it is full. Fill bags to the line indicated and fold or smash in the bag. Twigs and branches sticking out may cause injury to the loaders. Loaders have the right to leave bags not filled properly. Larger branches 3" or more in diameter must be cut into 3-foot lengths and bundled. Place bundles next to your yard waste bags. Grass is not permitted in yard waste bags. DO NOT put tree branches, sticks into a trash can, or leave them piled up (unbundled/untied) on the curb—it will not be collected. ■

► **Large Appliance and Tire Collection**

... TAKES PLACE THE WEEK OF APRIL 10 TO 13 ON YOUR REGULAR TRASH DAY. LARGE APPLIANCES INCLUDE WASHERS, DRYERS, DISHWASHERS, REFRIGERATORS, STOVES, FREEZERS, HOT WATER HEATERS, AIR CONDITIONERS, ETC. A \$12 BLUE TAG MUST BE PURCHASED AND ATTACHED TO EACH APPLIANCE. ITEMS TOO HEAVY TO BE LIFTED INTO A TRUCK BY TWO PEOPLE WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. EACH TIRE REQUIRES A \$2 PURPLE TAG, AND TIRES MUST BE REMOVED FROM THEIR RIMS. NO COMMERCIAL TRUCK TIRES WILL BE ACCEPTED. TAGS ARE PURCHASED AT THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE. Pet Waste Cleanup

We regularly receive complaints about animals in the township, and while the majority of pet owners are very responsible, we are hearing increasingly how dog owners are not cleaning up after their pets on public and others' private property. The township ordinance clearly states this is a violation. More than that, it is disrespectful and unsanitary. Currently, the ordinance does not compel residents to clean up after their pets in a timely manner on their own property, and policing that would be difficult to enforce, but some municipalities do so because of environmental and health implications.

Pet waste poses a significant impact on your health if not disposed of properly, and can introduce disease-causing



bacteria and parasites into the environment. Pet waste is not a good fertilizer. It is toxic to your lawn, causing burns and unsightly discoloring, and contains harmful bacteria such as giardia, salmonella and E. coli. Eggs of roundworms, hookworms, and tapeworms deposited by infected animals can linger in soil for years. Anyone who comes into contact with that soil through gardening, playing, or walking barefoot runs the risk of infection. Children are most susceptible, since they often play in the dirt and put things in their mouths or eyes.

Cleaning up after your pet is the right thing to do. Be considerate, carry plastic bags and paper towels in your pocket and dispose of pet waste properly in the trash. Your family, your neighbors, and the environment will appreciate your good manners. ■

2017 Road Maintenance

Lancaster Township makes every effort to keep its roads and streets in good repair. They are inspected frequently and, based on those inspections and average traffic flow, the roads to be repaved are chosen. The following is a preliminary list of roads/alleys to be repaved summer 2017, and is subject to change: River Drive (from Jackson Dr. to Ridge Rd.), Alley K (Atkins Ave. to Spencer Ave.), Elwood Avenue (Extended) (Spencer Ave. to President Ave.), Meadowbrook Road (River Dr. to Wilson Dr.), Alley S (Hamilton Park Dr. to Spring Grove Ave.), Alley U (S. School Ln. to Alley T), Alley T (S. School Ln. to Perry Ave.), Wickford Road (Meadowbrook Rd. to Wheatland Ave.).

Street Sweeping

Street sweeping resumes on April 4. Sweeping on "signed streets" takes place the first & third Tuesday and Wednesday of each month, starting on April 4. No sweeping on July 4th. **NO WARNING NOTICES WILL BE ISSUED! The police will enforce street signs that prohibit parking on certain days. When street sweeping ends, parking restrictions remain in force on signed streets due to leaf pickup beginning in October.**

Residents who keep the street in front of their property debris-free help make the biweekly sweeping easy. The biweekly sweeping schedule allows us to clean our other nonsigned neighborhoods more frequently. Please read the signs and move your vehicle. A vehicle parked illegally prevents the township from cleaning and maintaining the streets. Street/Alley Tree Policy

The property owner is responsible for the care and pruning of all trees and

shrubs along any street or township-maintained alley, whether in or out of the right-of way. Township alleys with overgrown trees, bushes, and hedges are very difficult to plow. They can cause plow equipment to break branches and damage right-of-way plantings, it is hard on equipment, and it can be dangerous for the operator. We are continuing an aggressive approach to removing and trimming trees and bushes in our township-maintained alleys.

Most alleys have a 14-foot right-of-way width that must be clear of any fences, vegetation, or objects within this 14-foot distance. Check your property! If you have right-of-way encroachment, please remove it.

A minimum distance of 14 feet must be maintained between the road surface and the lowest overhanging branch



above our streets. Smaller trees and shrubs should be pruned to allow signs to be clearly seen. We will be inspecting intersections for traffic visibility and bushes that need to be trimmed or removed for proper visibility. If the Public Works Department notices a visibility problem, you will be notified. The township reserves the right to do any necessary pruning if the property owner fails to maintain trees, bushes, or other plantings.

When a tree or tree limb blocks a township roadway and/or township alley, the Public Works Department will attempt to open the roadway for the

safe passage of vehicles. If a fallen tree or branch is too large for the Public Works Department to handle, the roadway will be closed and the property owner will have 24 hours to contact a tree-removal contractor and have the tree removed. It is the responsibility of the property owner to secure a private contractor to clean up the tree and remove any debris in order to reopen the roadway. When a property owner does not arrange for timely removal or cannot be reached, the township will have the obstruction removed by a contractor and the property owner will be billed for those services.

Yard/Woody Waste Dropoff

Yard/woody waste dropoff begins Saturday, April 1 for the first Saturday of the month drop off at our maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. Days and hours of operation are Monday-Thursday, 3pm to 7pm, until October 23 when hours change to 2pm to 5pm. **Closed all Fridays, and May 29, July 4, & Sept. 4.** The once-a-month Saturday drop off begins April 1, and continues the first Saturday of each month through November 4, 9am to noon. Closing date is Wednesday, November 22. **No contractors will be admitted; service is for township residents only.** Please have ID ready for the gate attendant who will also inspect your load for contaminants and point out the proper place to unload. Bio-bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit.

Mulch and Compost

After April 3, mulch/compost will be available for hand-loading from the area behind the main gate—Monday–Thursday, 3pm to 7pm. **Closed all Fridays.** Mulch/compost will be loaded Monday–Thursday, 3pm to 4pm, and the first Saturday of each month from 9am to Noon until June 3. After June 3, call (717) 293-1733 to check on availability and for loading times. All mulch/compost is free to Lancaster Township residents while supply lasts. **No contractors will be serviced.** ■

DEALING WITH DRUG PROBLEMS



Manheim Township Police Department, as well as many other police departments in Lancaster County and across the country, have experienced a voluminous increase in heroin-related incidents over the past few years. Officers are exponentially making more heroin and opioid-use paraphernalia arrests. In late 2015, MTPD officers were trained in the use of and began carrying naloxone, a prescription medication that blocks the effects of opioids and potentially reverses an overdose. Similar to the arrests made, officers have been administering more doses of naloxone year after year.

The use of heroin is not only a public-health concern, but also an issue affecting crime and safety in our neighborhoods. Bringing the community together to understand the steps we must take to combat this problem is a critical part of ending

heroin use and investigating the dealers.

Unfortunately, people do not always know where to turn for support, or are reluctant to reach out to law enforcement for assistance. The Lancaster County Drug and Alcohol Commission recommends the following local resources to seek help with heroin or opioid-related addiction:

- If you suspect an overdose or other medical emergency, call 911 immediately!
- If someone is threatening suicide or threatening to harm themselves or others, you can also call Crisis Intervention at (717) 394-2631.
- If someone is addicted to alcohol or other drugs and in need of detoxification, call White Deer Run Support Center at (866) 769-6822.
- If you need help or support in recovery, contact RASE of Lancaster, 131 East Orange Street, Lancaster, (717) 295-3080, ww.raseproject.org.
