# PERVIOUS PAVING IN A TOWNSHIP PARK

This past summer, the township public works department reinstalled and expanded the basketball court at the J. Robert Eckenrode Hamilton Park, located at Maple Avenue and South School Lane.

This park is a favorite for residents, and the township wanted to continue

try its first installation of pervious paving, which is an asphalt material that actually allows the water to run straight through and into the ground. Additional stone was needed to accept the volume of rain that might fall in a heavy storm, so 20 inches of stone was placed under the pervious paving material. This arrangement actually reduces runoff from the park and eases related problems downstream. The additional stone and excavation added a premium of roughly 25% to the cost of the project, but also eliminated any need for storm water management facilities to be installed.

As part of our MS4 Public Education and Outreach

Program, the township also installed an informational kiosk.

► **Leaf pickup for non-signed streets...**

BEGINS OCTOBER 9; ENDS DECEMBER 15. FOR SIGNED STREETS, IT BEGINS OCTOBER 17; ENDS DECEMBER 6. THERE WILL BE NO WARNING NOTICES; PARKING TICKETS WILL BE ISSUED.

► **Trash & recycling bills**

SEMIANNUAL TRASH & RECYCLING BILLS WILL BE MAILED OCTOBER 1, 2017, AND ARE DUE OCTOBER 30, 2017. RESIDENTS 60 YEARS OR OLDER CAN OBTAIN A 10% SENIOR DISCOUNT BY BRINGING ID WITH PROOF OF AGE TO THE TOWNSHIP OFFICE.

**PA Act 108 of 2010 instituted a recycling law for covered devices/e-waste. Residents are prohibited from disposing of televisions, computers and accessories, cell phones, cameras, etc. with curbside trash or recycling. These items must be taken to the Lancaster County Hazardous Waste Facility at 1299 Harrisburg Pike; (717) 397-9968.**

**Illegal dumping of any regulated material is a punishable offense. Lancaster Township will enforce all regulations and impose penalties on violators.**

**GETTING RID OF ALL THOSE LEAVES, ETC.**

**Y**ard waste curbside collection ends the week of October 9. Yard waste bio-bags will be available at the maintenance facility until Thursday, October 5 (or while supply lasts). Once collection stops, residents must take their bio-bags to the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane. After November 22, yard waste should be included with regular trash in plastic bags, and set out as part of your 96 gallons per week collection. **CHRISTMAS TREE COLLECTION**

**C**hristmas tree collection takes place January 8–11, 2018 on your scheduled trash day. This is the only free pickup and applies to **REAL TREES ONLY**. Trees



should not be put in the trash before January 8. All decorations must be removed; tree should not be in a bag. If you miss the collection, it will require a \$4 oversized item tag for trash disposal. Artificial trees are not included in this collection, and require a \$4 tag. Purchase tags at the township office. **REAL TREES** may also be dropped off at a designated area at the maintenance facility at 1357 Meadowcreek Lane, January 2–5 and January 8–12, 7:30 a.m.–3:30 p.m. No tree bags and absolutely no woody waste will be accepted. ■

**PAPER SHREDDING EVENT**

**A** free shredding event will take place on Saturday, April 7, 2018 from 9:00 a.m. to Noon for Lancaster Township residents only. More details to come in the spring/summer newsletter and on the township website. ■



► **Large appliance & tire collection**

... is scheduled for the week of November 6 through 9 on your regular collection day. Large appliances include washers, dryers, dishwashers, refrigerators, dehumidifiers, etc. A \$12 blue tag must be attached to each appliance. Items too heavy to be lifted into a truck by two people will not be accepted. Each tire requires a \$2 purple tag, and must be removed from the rim. Commercial truck tires not accepted. Purchase tags at the township office. Place your address and item(s) on the collection list at least two business days in advance of your collection day. **Planning & Zoning**

**Building and zoning permits**

One of the important responsibilities of the Planning and Zoning Department is the issuing of building and zoning permits. Critical to that process is the submission of a completed application. Since April of 2014, Storm Water Management is necessary for most building and zoning applications. While applications may vary, some things are constant. When submitting an application, please keep in mind a few very important things:

1. We require three (3) complete sets of detailed plans for all construction or renovation work.
2. Liability insurance must be provided by one of the following:
  - a. Independent contractor (with no employees)
  - b. Contractor
  - c. Property owner
3. An applicant signature is required for every application.
4. Cost of the project must be included.

By state law, the township has fifteen (15) days to process completed residential building permit applications. The process includes inputting the information into our system, zoning review, plan review and comment, and other administrative work, including fees assessment. The 15 day process begins only after an application has been deemed complete. We try our best to turn applications around as quickly as possible and rarely does it take the full 15 days.

Planning ahead for the permit process goes a long way toward ensuring that your project begins and ends on schedule. **Public Works Department**

**Leaf pickup ...**

... for non-signed streets begins October 9; ends December 15. For signed streets, it begins October 17; ends December 6. Schedule may be altered at any time due to weather conditions. When street sweeping ends, parking restrictions remain in force on signed streets due to leaf pickup beginning. There will be no warning notices; parking tickets will be issued. Police will enforce street signs that prohibit parking on certain days. Check out the township’s website at [www.twp.lancaster.pa.us](http://www.twp.lancaster.pa.us) to see what area the crew is working.

There is no scheduled day for leaves to be picked up, except for signed streets. Leaves are collected on a rotating basis. The crew starts at one end of the township, and continues day after day until the entire township has had a collection, then it starts all over again. If you reside on a street with signed parking restrictions (the first & third Tuesdays and Wednesdays of the month), please abide by the schedule as



it appears on that sign to avoid a parking ticket. The no-parking regulation allows a more complete leaf pickup and provides safety for the crew members.

Residents are reminded that grass clippings are not to be placed on the street for pickup as it clogs the machinery; it will be left on the street for proper disposal.

The township will continue to pick up bagged leaves on some high-traffic state highways that are not included in the regular schedule. Plastic or paper bio-bags can be used. Call (717) 293-1733 when your bags of leaves are at curbside ready for pickup.

**Final dates for leaf pickup (weather permitting!)**

- Monday, Dec. 11: All areas between Columbia Ave., Marietta Ave., Race Ave., and 0-200 block River Drive.
- Tuesday, Dec. 12: All signed areas in East and West Township including Conestoga Woods area.
- Wednesday, Dec. 13: All signed areas in East and West Township finish Conestoga Woods area.
- Thursday, Dec. 14: All areas between Marietta Ave. and Newton Rd. N., President Ave., and the 300-700 block of River Dr.
- Friday, Dec. 15: Areas west of Abbeville Rd., School House Rd., N. Bausman Dr., Bausman, Gable Park, Bentley Lane, Chadwick Circle, Bean Hill Rd., Wedge Wood, Windolph Landing, Honeysuckle Ln., and Millrace Development.

**Yard waste**

Yard/woody waste drop-off will continue through November 22. Days and hours of operation are Monday-Thursday, 3 p.m.–7 p.m. On November 6 hours change to 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. Please have ID ready for the gate attendant. This drop-off service is for residents only. **NO CONTRACTORS WILL BE ADMITTED.** Yard waste bags are available from the attendant, up to a maximum of 10 bags per visit, until October 5 (or while supply lasts); 20-bag limit per week per property owner. Bio-bags can also be purchased at Lowes or Home Depot.

**Snowstorms**

During a snowstorm, while the snow is still falling, the road crew makes an “Emergency Pass,” plowing in two directions up and down the street to allow for the passage of emergency vehicles. After the snow stops, the crew will return to widen the streets for on-street parking and allow room for future storms. Please remove vehicles from the street, if possible, to allow plows to get close to the edge of the road in order to

get the road as wide as possible.

It is recommended that reflective markers be placed along your yard in non-curbed areas. It is impossible for the plow driver to determine where the road edge is and your lawn edge begins. Sometimes mailboxes are toppled or damaged by the snowplow if they are too close to the road edge or mounted poorly. Even properly installed mailboxes can be damaged by heavy wet snow that comes off the plow more forcefully. Every effort is made by our operators to avoid or minimize damage to property; however, the repair of mailboxes, lawn areas, trees, and/or shrubbery planted on the right-of-way is the property owner's responsibility.

**Extra steps after a snowstorm:**

- Snow should be plowed or shoveled to the side of the driveway away from the flow of traffic.
- Clearing snow for a distance before the driveway allows the plow to unload before reaching the driveway entrance.
- Eliminate snow piles at driveway entrances; they may obstruct a motorist's vision on the main road, as well as those exiting the driveway.
- Please assist the fire and highway departments by clearing snow away from fire hydrants and opening up storm inlets to allow the melting snow a place to go and avoid possible flooding of the roadway.
- Do not throw snow onto roads after they have been plowed. This creates hazardous driving conditions and is against the law by violating Ordinance No. 3 of 1987. ■

## Lancaster Family YMCA



**I**n 2011, the Lancaster Family YMCA launched the first Cancer Rehabilitation Exercise (CaRE) class in collaboration with Penn Medicine/ Lancaster General Health. The 12-week class was designed to help cancer patients use exercise therapy to overcome the residual effects of cancer treatments such as fatigue, loss of appetite and strength. The first class was held at the Lampeter-Strasburg YMCA branch and participants for the program were selected by oncologists at LG Health. The CaRE program is now offered three times per year at the YMCA's Lampeter-Strasburg, Lancaster City and New Holland branches.

A report by researchers at the University of Rochester Medical Center recently published in the Journal of the American Medical Association's *JAMA Oncology*, stated that of all the studies they could find on the various ways to help cancer patients get their energy back, exercise was the clear winner. The many cancer survivors who have gone through the YMCA's CaRE classes would agree with that analysis. In some cases, they felt stronger and able to do more physical activities than before cancer.

CaRE is a fully-subsidized, 12-week program offered at all Lancaster Family YMCA branches. ### No Open Burning in the Township!

**A**s fall ushers in cooler weather, the Lancaster Township Fire Department would like to remind you Lancaster Township has a No Open Burning ordinance which includes portable outdoor fireplaces and recreational fire pits. The ordinance prohibits open burning of yard waste, burn barrels, camp fires, chimineas, etc. While it may seem harmless, outdoor burning generates air pollution, which affects human health and poses a danger to children, pregnant women, senior citizens, and those with existing respiratory difficulties. Smoke from recreational fires is the source of many odor and nuisance complaints to the police department by neighbors when smoke enters their home through open windows and screen doors.



Under the Lancaster Township open burning ordinance Chapter 121, it is unlawful to ignite, kindle, or maintain any bonfire or other fire.

Violations are subject to fines of \$50–\$300, plus costs. ■

- Following significant snowfall, please locate and clear out your nearest fire hydrant. This can help save valuable time in the event of a fire at your home.
- Check that chimney before turning on your heat. Make sure your chimney is open and free of obstructions. A clogged or cracked chimney can cause a fire and can cause Carbon Monoxide (CO) to enter your home. In high concentrations CO can be deadly.
- Make sure we can find you. Your address should be displayed on the front of your home so it is visible from the street. Lafayette does offer green reflective address signs for sale. If you need one, contact the fire station at (717) 392-5097.
- And finally— **Check those smoke detectors!!** Properly operating smoke detectors do indeed save lives!!
